REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE FAIRVILLE EGG CIRCLE, No. 48.

The annual meeting of the Fairville Egg Circle was held at Avondale School House on Thursday, January 28. There was a good attendance present considering the inclemency of the weather. The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock p. m. by the President J. A. Keoughan, who outlined the business before the meeting. He then called upon the Secretary, J. A. O'Donnell, who read the minutes of the last annual meeting, which after some discussion were adopted.

His statement also showed funds on hand sufficient to pay all expenses for the year. The President then called upon the Manager of the Circle, Jos. D. Hughes for his report which showed that during the season of 1920 under date of Dec. 15, 1919 to Dec. 31, 1920. Eggs were supplied by 45 patrons. Total of dozen shipped by Circle

The total value of all Eggs shipped during the season at present average price per doz. at present value of all eggs shipped, bad eggs included of almost 47% per dozen. The Manager explained that this was not the net average for the Circle, because the rebate for the season of 1920 has not been distributed to any Circle as yet, so that whatever rebate should be received later would be in addition to what was given in this statement. He also stated that the number of empty cases on hand in Circle corresponded with the number charged by the Candling Station to the Circle.

The twelve highest patrons shipping during the season of 1920 are given in the order named.

Before closing his statement the Manager said he would like to refer to the splendid showing made by the highest patron, Mr. Augustus Wisner who from 125 White Wyandotte hens shipped 960 2-12 dozen of select eggs only 71 dozen of No. 2 eggs and 6 bad eggs making a grand total of 1031 8-12 dozen at a present value of \$506.27. This he stated was the result attention to breeding, feeding and care of eggs. It was an example worthy of more than passing notice and one which more of us should try to follow.

This concluded the Manager's report which was afterwards adopted. Jos. Carmichael and Jos. D. Hughes were appointed delegates to attend the annual meeting to be held at Charlottetown on January 26th. The following directors were then balloted for the present year, 1921 Augustus Wisner, John Boylen, John J. Guley, Herbert T. Vick-

erson, Jos. Carmichael, W. P. Cairns and Thos. Dunphy. After which a hearty vote of thanks was ably moved by Wm. P. Cairns, seconded by President J. A. Keoughan to the Manager Jos. D. Hughes for his faithful and satisfactory services as Manager of the Circle for the past three years and carried. The Manager replied thanking them as members one and all for their many kindnesses shown him during the past three years as Manager, also a hearty vote of thanks was ably moved by John A. O'Keefe, seconded by Jos. D. Hughes to the retiring directors for their long and valuable services in the interest of Egg Circle work and co-operation work in general.

The meeting was then addressed by Mr. McLeod of Ukg, showing the value of Basic Slag as a fertilizer, after which the meeting adjourned.
