League of Nations Seeking Action

GENEVA, August 3.—The fourth annual assembly of the League of Nations, which will convene at Geneva September 3, for a month's session, will be more pregnant of possibilities than any of the three preceding sessions.

The assembly gives every indication of being punctuated throughout with surprises. Two important changes or developments that have taken place in the League during the past year.

In other words the League instead of being content with handling more or less routine questions proposes to but in its own initiative on current questions, such as reparations inter-allied debts, the Ruhr, the near-east and every other issue that is constituting an obstacle to peace.

While none of these questions figure at the present time on the agenda, owing to the fact that the agenda has to be drawn up and finalized to all Leaguers four months in advance, nevertheless the constitution of the League permits all such current questions to be brought up on the floor of the assembly.

Each assembly opens with a presentation by the League Council of its report for the past year. This corresponds to the usual "address from the throne" and a general debate immediately ensues.

Any member has the right to inject into the debate any current question, such as reparations or the Ruhr, by merely demanding why the council did not take up the question of its own initiative and try to solve it.

While the past assemblies have been a trifle shy about getting into deep water by injecting such questions, there is every indication that such a participant can no longer prevail. The League has admittedly received world-wide criticism or failure to tackle some of the more important questions that are manifestly delaying world-wide adjustment. There is a steadily growing world-wide demand that the League become a more active element in the handling of every great international question.

Finally, heavy pressure is being brought to bear on Switzerland, Holland, Denmark, the Scandinavian countries and others to demand before the Assembly that the League delve into the problems of reparations, inter-allied debts, the Ruhr and other questions that need immediate solution if Europe is ever to get readjusted.

The Assembly will be in the hands of the liberals, with Lord Robert Cecil as leader, something which the assemblies have always lacked in the past.

Although Lord Robert Cecil has been a participant at all of the past assemblies, it has only been as the delegate from South Africa and not England.

On the other hand the English delegation has always been headed by Lord Balfour who not only deprived Cecil of assuming leadership in the past assemblies, but he himself never undertook leadership.

This year there is every indication that with Lord Robert Cecil heading the English delegation he will assume virtual leadership of the League Assembly. He will be surrounded by a group of other strong liberals, such as General Smuts, who will come personally this time to represent South Africa, Branting of Sweden, Dr. Naess of Norway, and many men who believe that the League and the League Assembly should begin playing the leading role in international affairs.

Lord Robert Cecil is the architect of the League and should expect to every current political question that needs settlement.

Another big surprise which the fourth Assembly may witness is that of the application of Germany or membership. Powerful influences are now being brought to bear on Germany to enter the League at this time. No doubt exists but that she will be elected, but nevertheless that would entail not only a bitter fight but possible some startling consequences.

Mr. Acton Burrows Visits the Island

Mr. Acton Burrows, proprietor of "Canadian Railway and Marine World", arrived in Charlottetown on Thursday night from Toronto, having stayed over in Montreal and Moncton to see one of the Canadian National Railway chief officials.

He spent some time yesterday morning with Superintendent Grady of the Island Division and left in the afternoon for a short holiday at Brackley Beach. In a chat with the Guardian, Mr. Burrows spoke of his first visit in 1898 and where he has treasured.

Speaking with a thorough knowledge of the whole of Canada he declared emphatically that he considered the island the most attractive summer holiday place in the Dominion.

Mr. Burrows, in addition to his personal business activities was for a number of years chairman of the Canadian Press Association Trade and Class Paper section and was one of the founders of the Canadian National Newspapers and Periodicals Association of which he was the first president and of which he is still a director and chairman of its legislative committee. He is also honorary vice president of the Canadian Electric Railway Association which is composed of the electric railway companies from Nova Scotia to British Columbia.

Probably the most constructive job which the assembly will tackle will be that of launching an international treaty of mutual guarantee as a basis of disarmament.

Another important item on the agenda is the American program to limit the world-wide production of harmful drugs. The election of Ireland as a member of the League will also take place during the course of the session.

Dr. Wiggins' Jubilee

Sackville Tribune: On St. Bartholomew's Day, Aug. 24th one of Sackville's most venerable and beloved Clergymen, Rev. Dr. S. F. Wiggins, rector of St. Paul's and St. Ann's (Anglican) churches, will have completed fifty years in the work of the ministry; and, deserving the fact that he is on the verge of the octogenarian class, his voice still rings with the old-time fire of eloquence and earnestness both in the pulpit and on the public platform. It is but fitting that the jubilee of this faithful priest's service to the church should be fittingly celebrated; and it is with pleasure and interest that the Tribune publishes this brief sketch of a man of God, who has fought a good fight, and is still on active service.

It will be of interest to our readers to note that the Rev. Cecil Frederick Wiggins, M. A., D. C. L., was born on St. Bartholomew's Day, August 24th, 1844 at St. Eleanore's P. E. I., being a son of the late Rev. Dr. Wiggins and his wife Helen Townsend, of Charlottetown, P. E. I. He was educated at King's College, Windsor's N. S., being graduated in 1869, B. A., and received the degree of D. C. L. Upon graduating, Dr. Wiggins took the post of Classical Master at the Collegiate Institute, St. Catharines and was later tutor at Bishop Lewis College of Picton, Ont. In 1872 he gave up teaching to complete his reading for Orders, under the Rev. J. D. Forsyth, rector of St. Eleanor's (P. E. I.) and was ordained on his birthday, St. Bartholomew's Day, 1873, by Bishop Binney in Halifax. For the next seven years, the Rev. Dr. Wiggins was vicar for the Rev. Dr. White, at Shelburne, N. S., and in 1880 was appointed to the rectory of Sackville, N. B., which he still holds. He was also dean of Shediac for twelve years.

While in Shelburne, the Rev. Dr. Wiggins met his fiancée, Miss Catherine Freeman, whom he married in 1880, when he came to Sackville. The marriage was blessed with three daughters, Gretchen, and three sons, Robert Selwyn (deceased), John Keeble (at home), Nora, wife of Mr. Fred A. Fisher, manager of the Enterprise Foundry Company Ltd., Sackville, N. B., Helen, Mrs. Ernest Melville (deceased), Reginald (student at McGill University).

During the Great War, Rev. Dr. Wiggins wrote a volume of sermons, which was published in 1918 under the title, "Saved by Fire."
