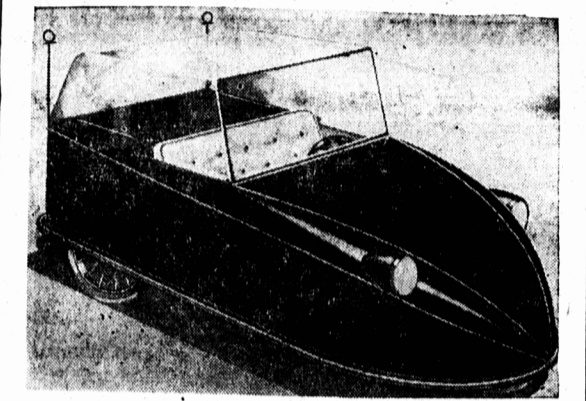
Strike Averted
