Priest To Visit Native Parish Of Charlottetown

Rev. J. A. Monaghan, S. J., To Sing First Solemn Mass Next Sunday.

Rev. J. Alfred Monaghan, S. J., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Monaghan, Weymouth, Street, City will arrive in the city this evening on a visit to his native parish. Father Monaghan was born in Charlottetown and graduated from Queen Square School in 1918. He then entered St. Dunstan's University from which he graduated in 1922. The same year he entered the Society of Jesus and completed his studies in Dublin, Ireland where he was ordained to the priesthood on July 31, 1925.

Father Monaghan is well known in the city and his many friends will be glad to welcome him home again especially those who remember their happy associations with him some years ago in the League of the Cross Society.

Father Monaghan will sing his first Solemn Mass in St. Dunstan's Basilica next Sunday at 11 o'clock. Also arriving in the city this evening is Rev. Thomas Hynes, S. J., who was also ordained in Dublin on July 31, 1925. Father Hynes is a native of Cardigan and will sing his first Solemn Mass in All Saints Church, Cardigan next Sunday.

Is Admitted To Bar; Receives Congratulations

Mr. Frederick Charles Bentley of Charlottetown was admitted as an attorney of the court and called to the Bar at the adjourned sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown recently. Mr. Bentley had taken a three years course at Prince of Wales College and had then entered Acadia University where he received the degree of Bachelor of Arts. He attended the Law School of Dalhousie University where he received the degree of LL.B. He served his time under articles of clerkship with the firm of McLeod and Bentley here.

Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, the presiding judge, briefly addressed the newly called barrister extending his congratulations on his career as a student and his best wishes for equal success at the bar.

Mr. Bentley and Mr. Frederic Alfred Large were appointed commissioners for taking affidavits in the Supreme Court.

The appeal case, the King respondent vs. Chester McDonald appellant, was added to the docket at this sitting and duly tried. The appeal was allowed and the conviction quashed. The appellant had been convicted in the lower court for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor. Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., appeared for the appellant and the Attorney General for the Crown.

Motion for dismissal with costs was made by respondent counsel in the case Senator J. J. Hughes, plaintiff respondent, vs. Mrs. Catherine Melver, defendant appellant. Judgment was reserved. Mr. A. F. McQuaid, K. C., Solicitor, appeared for the respondent and Mr. A. Van Farmer, Charlottetown, for the appellant.

A rather unusual situation arose in this case for since entering the appeal the appellant passed away and there had been no administration of his estate. The present statement of the attorney who had represented the appellant in her lifetime presented some difficulty. The court adjourned sine die.

The veteran parliamentarian was greatly interested in the Provincial Building and the Confederation Chamber.

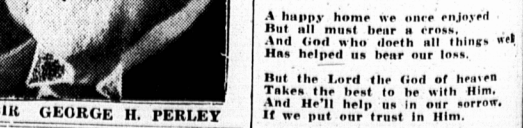
