BRITISH SHIPBUILDING.

Recently compiled statistics show that the volume of English shipbuilding is steadily increasing, notwithstanding its vast proportions during recent years. In July last 23 vessels of 99,356 gross tons were launched, as against 22 vessels of 76,818 tons in June, and 27 vessels of 83,192 tons in July, 1900.

For seven months ended with July English builders have launched 154 vessels of 522,055 tons, as compared with 151 vessels of 493,290 tons in the corresponding period of 1900.

For the entire United Kingdom in the seven months there were launched this year 321 vessels totalling 890,392 tons, as compared with 327 vessels of 726,879 tons in the like period last year. The total exceeds that of the like period in the past three years, and exceeds that of 1897 by 237,136 tons.

It will be seen by the foregoing figures that British shipyards are busier and more productive than ever before, and this applies as well to the yards of England as to those of Scotland and Ireland. There is not in these facts much support for the notion that British industry is lapsing into "decadence." Should the rate of production of the first seven months of the year be continued to the end the twelve months' production will exceed 1,500,000 tons of steel ships from British yards alone—a truly enormous aggregate.

Canada is now producing as much wheat as was produced in the United States in the years between 1830 and 1810 when their population was three times as great as that of the Dominion is now. The United States now consumes at home two thirds of its wheat product, and with the rapid growth of population and no new wheat areas to be opened up the time is coming, probably within the next fifty years, when all the wheat grown within the bounds of the Republic will be required to feed the home population. Canada, on the contrary, with her vast wheat areas not yet cultivated must continue for a century to come to increase both her production and her exportation of wheat.

The Commonwealth of Australia is discussing the adoption of the decimal system of coinage. So far the Australian colonies have held to the British system of pounds, shillings and pence. This leads the Toronto World to remark that the Empire ought to have an imperial coinage based on the decimal system. It would facilitate trade within the Empire, and with foreign nations as well. There are difficulties in the way, but they are not insurmountable. The British sixpence is very nearly an aliquot part of our dollar, and the penny very nearly the equivalent of two cents Canadian. The Victoria Bankers' Association recommends that the farthing be taken as the unit of coinage and that the sovereign be made the equivalent of 1000 farthings instead of 960 as at present.

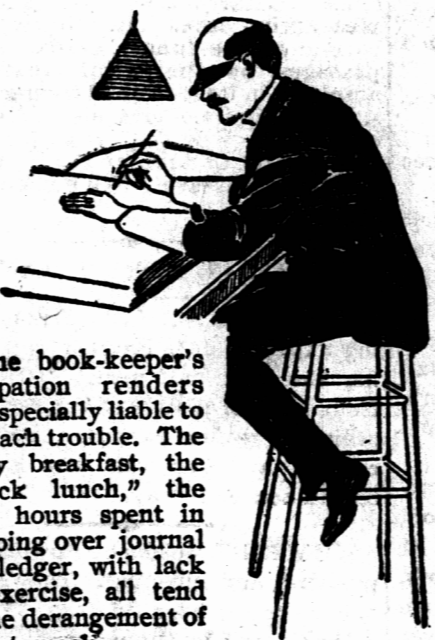
