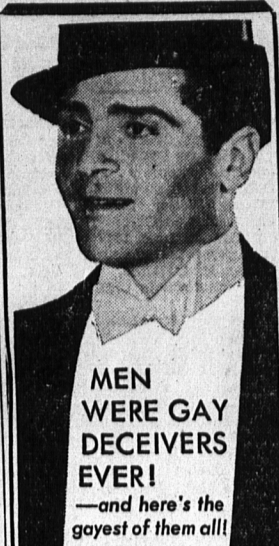

Reduction In Trans-Atlantic Travel Fares

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Feb. 23 - (C. P. - Havas) - Great reduction in trans-Atlantic travel fares were announced today by the North Atlantic Passenger Conference, representing steamship lines operating from British ports to the United States and Canada.

Tourist fares on all ships except the Grand French liner Normandie and the Cunard White Star's Queen Mary, now under construction, were increased slightly.

The new rates are effective tomorrow and cover three classes of accommodations - cabin, tourist and third.

The flowers today were presented in memoriam. This is known as "The Canadian Education Week." It was therefore fitting that the installation of officers and teachers in the Sunday School should take place at the religious service and should turn to the subject of religious education. Training for right living was the theme of Rev. Mr. Miller's address. A trained mind and a pure heart are both necessary. The church's special task is the religious education of the youth. It is a healthy sign when secular education is stressing the necessity of emphasizing the moral and spiritual values. Christ as a child in the centre of the church and there the child has remained. So it is even in this day, many come to church, but few are really touched by the voice of the congregation, nor by the importance of the members assembled, nor by the amount of the offering, but rather should we judge a service by the extent of the sincerity of the worshippers. What really matters is whether or not the worshippers come together, come near to Jesus with the definite purpose of pressing forth and touching Him in faith.

(Continued from Page 1) show that German factories are producing 300 pieces of artillery and 200 tanks monthly. Japanese industry is organized, the newspaper said, to produce during the first year of war thousands of field guns, 1,000,000 shells, 1,000,000 rifles, 30,000 machine-guns, 1,000 tanks, 3,000 airplanes and 600,000 tons of warships.

Poland was declared to have 1,000 airplanes, 600 tanks and to be building roads to facilitate the transportation of German troops to the Soviet border.

Finland was accused of preparing airdromes for use of German military machines.

An article in the newspaper Pravda said Japanese and German negotiations, which are reported here to have resulted in a military understanding, also included a proposal for mutual action by naval forces. (Both Germany and Japan have denied such an agreement.)

Celebration of the Red Army anniversary included contests among civilians, marksmen, airplane flights, parachute jumping, gas mask drills and long ski runs.

"We beg you to accept our thanks for all that you have been and have done for us."

The result of Father MacDonald's care and attention is evident in the fact that the Indian population of this Province, instead of being on the decrease, as has been the case in other parts, has more than maintained its own.

Father MacDonald has many relatives here, one of his nephews being Dr. A. A. McDonald, Souris. His funeral will take place on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan will officiate.
