PRINCE OF BIG GUN

BLOWN OVER A MILE

The work of destroying the condemned guns at Fort Ogilvie, has been completed. Seven guns were blown up, and the work of mounting five modern guns, similar to those used at Ladysmith, belonging to H. M. S. Powerful, has been commenced. The blowing up of the obsolete guns was accompanied with considerable danger; in fact several men had very narrow escapes. The first gun was blown up with gun cotton. Either too heavy a charge was used or proper precautions had not been taken. It was expected that the force of the explosion would not do much more than break the gun; but the unexpected happened. The gun was blown in pieces and the force of the explosion can be judged by the fact that a piece of metal from the gun, weighing about 75 pounds, was blown from Fort Ogilvie to Greenbank, a distance of one mile. This piece fell near the band stand and a short distance from a carriage containing ladies and gentlemen. A hole had been made in the ground, in which to place the gun preparatory to firing the shot. An examination showed that the force of the explosion had made the hole about two feet deeper. Gun cotton was not used on the next gun. Dynamite was employed. The shot blew half of the gun away from the muzzle to the centre. After further experiments the right kind of a charge was obtained, and no further difficulty was experienced. —Halifax Herald.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And Its Attraction To Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, and the scenery is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breezes and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing at about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light and Power Company two Electric light plants, and a street railway is in embryo. It has a first class water works and sewerage system. It is famed for its wide and shady streets, its many pleasant drives the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water and clear cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera house. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief resorts of the citizens here. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packing establishments in the Dominion. On the west side is Victoria Park—a favorite summer resort—while on the east are the magnificent new Exhibition Building and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares is Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, a fountain and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen and Revere.

Summerside has above 3000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedeque Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ, Strathcona and Campbell. Georgetown and Souris have a population of about 1,000 each. In the former are the Aitken and Tapper hotels and in Souris the Sea View. At Cape Traverse a very pleasant summer resort, is the Landsdown hotel; in Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wisner; in Tignish the Railway and Bellevue; in Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in Montague, McDonald, and in Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson's.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View; at Stanhope, Mutch's and Cliff; at Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Seaside; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaford; and at Pownal, Florida.

In addition to those already mentioned there are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodation, while many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams teem with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description abounds.

WOULD THEY SELL?

There is very good authority for the statement that the Morgau interests will shortly invade Canadian territory and attempt a combination of the Dominion, the Montreal and other large cotton industries. Questioned on the subject by a Witness reporter, a gentleman who is very prominent in one of the largest of these concerns acknowledged that he understood there was an agent of Mr. Morgau's visiting in the city, and that he was interesting himself in the affairs of the different companies. "And would your company sell?" was asked. "Why wouldn't we sell if we got our price?" was the reply. —McInt'r at Witness.

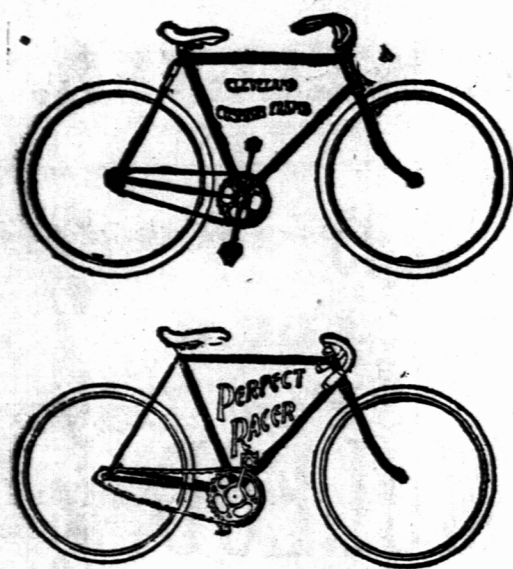

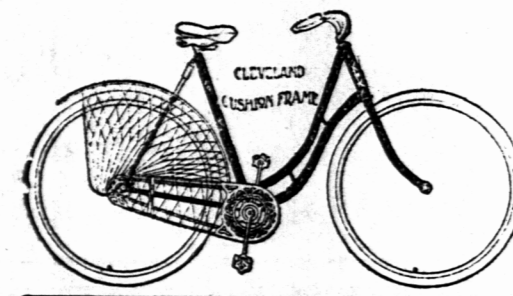
