Drew Indorses Peakres Statement Re Reinforcements

TORONTO, April 25 — (CP)—Premier Drew of Ontario last night told the 13th biennial convention of the Ontario Command of the Canadian Legion that every man in uniform should be made available for active service everywhere.

He was commenting on a speech made by Maj.-Gen. G. R. Peakres, general officer commanding-in-chief of the Pacific Command, Saturday to members of the Pacific Coast Rangers, in which Gen. Peakres said: "no man should wear that khaki uniform unless he is willing to wear it anywhere."

The Premier said every veteran should take "appropriate action" and urged Legionnaires to return to their homes and raise their voices "so that your commands might be heard all over Canada."

He added: "You know as others do not, what reinforcements mean at the hour when victory or defeat may hang in the balance. Nearly everyone here has seen occasions when adequate reinforcements meant the difference between victory and defeat."

Gen. Peakres also knows, it is his duty to tell the people of Canada about it. When Gen. Peakres says reinforcements are necessary there should not be any more delay in making every man in uniform available.

Premier Drew said the "greatest fighting team" in history is ready for the invasion of Europe but he added that peace "can only be ours if the people of the British Empire and the United States stand together in peace as in war."

The first step toward this is a closer partnership of the British Empire under the British flag.

"I cannot forget that there are people in Canada who believe our close association with Britain should be their right, in a democracy. But it is also our right to let them know Canada will remain British and when the war is over we want to be there."

Flying Officer Is Speaker At War Loan Meeting

FO. Robert Mullen, D. F. M., who has had 44 operational flights over Europe was the guest speaker at last night's largely attended war loan meeting at Borden.

The officer, who is stationed at an airport near Summerside, told the audience how he had been associated with Elmer Muttart of Borden during training and later overseas. The young man since has made the supreme sacrifice.

FO. Mullen said himself and the Borden boy had been together at Camp Borden and went overseas together in March of 1941. They were on a number of operations together until finally the speaker said, they were transferred to different squadrons.

He described air raids on England, mentioning particularly ones on Liverpool and London. In the British capital he was bound for a place when a raid came. Before he reached there a bomb wrecked the building, killing 80 persons.

He said the boys overseas were fighting and working their hearts out and "we have to do the same thing here." By buying victory bonds, he continued "you are investing money in yourself and in your blood relations overseas. Canada belongs to you and to them."

Mr. C. St. Clair Rodgers presided last night.

Other speakers included Rev. F. M. Baxter, Mayor J. P. McInnis and Mr. B. Graham Rogers. The latter showed very interesting motion pictures.
