It is needless to give a sketch of the arguments used by him as so many on the Island will have an opportunity to hear him and I would strongly advise all to hear him who can, especially if they are in doubt as to what stand to take on the 29th inst. His reasoning is clear and logical and as he made point after point he was frequently interrupted by the applause of the audience. At the close of the meeting the following questions were asked of him, all of which he answered in a very satisfactory manner.

First. Under Prohibition would there not likely be a great deal of smuggling and would it not be difficult to deal with? Second. Would not the cost of enforcing Prohibition be very great? Third. Should all the Provinces be one or two give a decided majority for Prohibition. What would be the result? I would advise any person, who is troubled about these points, to attend the meetings and ask the rev. gentleman to explain.—COM.
