#### MR. G. W. WARREN

Summerside mourns today the death of one of its oldest and most highly revered citizens in the person of Mr. George W. Warren, who passed peacefully to his eternal reward at noon on Friday, January 21st, at the age of 82 years.

The deceased had been in failing health for some time, brought on by the infirmities of age, but it was only about a week previous to his death that he took to his bed, there to remain until the end came. In the passing of Mr. Warren, a citizen of outstanding Christian character and integrity is removed, a man prominent in the activities of the church which he honored with his membership, and whose daily life was an attestation of the religion he lived.

For many years Mr. Warren was a partner of the firm of Warren, Hicks & McMurdo, who conducted an important general merchandise business in Summerside some years ago. In his dealings with the public the good name and integrity of Mr. Warren was never questioned and he won the esteem and respect of all. In the Baptist Church of this town he was for a great many years a deacon and was church clerk for nearly forty years as well as being for a long period a teacher in the Sunday School. He was always interested in the cause of temperance and in this, as in other good works, his life proved an example. He leaves to cherish his memory, his widow, and two daughters, Mrs. E. W. Manson and Mrs. (Dr.) H. T. Colvin, of Summerside, to all of whom sincere sympathy is extended.

## NOVA SCOTIA GIRL SLAIN NEAR BOSTON

Blow Fracturing Skull Caused Death—Other Wounds Indicate She Was Beaten—Body Found in Swamp.

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 24.—Mabel Matheson, of Whycoomagh, N. S., whose body was found in a swamp in the West Roxbury district yesterday, was murdered, authorities were convinced tonight as the result of an autopsy.

The autopsy, by Medical Examiner Timothy J. Leary, disclosed a blow over the right eye, fracturing the skull, had caused her death. The doctor's examination revealed two other wounds on the back of her head, indicating that the girl had been beaten with a rasp or some similar instrument. The facts revealed by the autopsy led the police to discard the theory that the girl had been struck by an automobile and that her body had been carried to a swamp by a panic-stricken driver. Captain James P. Smith of the West Roxbury police said there was no doubt in his mind that the girl was murdered. A broken chain was found on the girl's wrist, but the watch which the chain had secured was discovered some distance from the body, discounting the theory of robbery. Her handbag and vanity case were also near the body.

Miss Florence Marsella, of Dedham, an acquaintance of the victim, told the police that the Matheson girl had asked the loan of a dress from her to wear to a dance "Friday night," but that she did not know whether she had gone to the dance. The police also interviewed other girls who were acquainted with Miss Matheson without obtaining any clue to aid in the solution of the mystery.

Miss Matheson, who was 18 years old, came to West Roxbury from the little hamlet Whycoomagh, in Inverness county, N. S., a year ago last November to live with her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Angus MacRitchie. They identified her body, which was found only a short distance from their home.

It was in their loss. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon from her home, where a short service was held by the pastor, Rev. A. McLeod, to the Baptist Church, adjacent to the Peoples Cemetery. The service at the church was very largely attended by people of all denominations and creeds, the church being filled to capacity. The service was conducted jointly by Rev. A. A. McLeod, Rev. R. L. Morton and Rev. M. C. MacDonald. The pastor, Rev. Mr. MacDonald spoke from the words, "Lay up for thyself treasure that will not decay, neither moth nor rust shall corrupt it." He was assisted by Rev. Mr. McLeod, who read the funeral prayer. The service was a touching example of the deceased. The pallbearers were Messrs. John D. Jones, David McMurdo, Major Schurman, Dr. A. W. Leard, John Smallman, S. M. Hicks.

### Emerald Dairy Meeting

The Annual Dairy Meeting of the Emerald Association was held in the B. I. S. Hall in Emerald, on Wednesday, 19th inst. The President, Mr. George Mayne presided, and the attendance of patrons and shareholders was larger than usual. A statement of dairying in the province was read by the Secretary, and satisfactorily received. Although the price paid for milk was much lower than for some years past, it was anticipated that better results might be expected in the incoming season, as conditions have improved in the markets of Great Britain since the settlement of the prolonged labor strike. The past season's output of cheese exceeded the previous year by 21,571 lbs.

Several patrons supplied large quantities of milk, the largest being Mr. F. McCarroll, 34,623 lbs. with Messrs. W. Sedon, Everett Haslam, J. McSwain, Emma Hughes, Joseph Hughes, Geo. Mayne and others high on the list. The following officers were appointed for the ensuing year:—L. C. McDonald, President; Wm. H. Deighan, Vice-President; Geo. H. Mayne, Marshall Hughes, Peter Sinclair, D. N. McKay and Joseph Hughes, Directors. Geo. H. Mayne, the retiring President, was appointed to represent the Association at the Dairy Meeting to be held in March. A dividend of 6% was voted to stock holders for the year 1927.

#### King Ferdinand Wins His Fight For Domination

Now Practically Certain That His Beloved Son, Prince Carol, Will Succeed Him on the Throne.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—King Ferdinand of Rumania, it is stated, in reports reaching Rumanian circles here, has won his fight for the political and dynastic domination of his own kingdom. It is now practically certain, it is stated, that his beloved son, Prince Carol, will succeed him on the throne in a few weeks. Ferdinand, abdicating in order to proceed to France to wage a battle for his life against the disease which has been undermining his health for years. Meanwhile it is regarded as assured that Carol and his wife, Princess Helen, from whom he has been estranged for more than a year, will be reconciled somewhere in Italy.

All this means, it is stated, the removal of former Premier J. C. Bratianu as the invisible dictator of Rumania and the elimination of all political councils of the country. The reports reaching Rumanian circles in Paris say these results were attained at conferences held in Bucharest Saturday and Sunday between Premier Averescu and Bratianu.

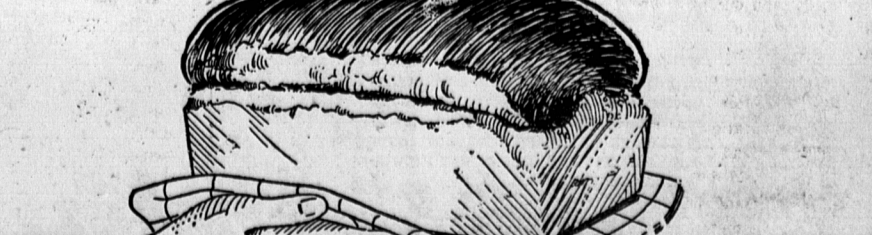

Bulls were weighed up from \$3.50 to \$5.50 as trading advanced prices seemed weaker in indications were that there would be several lots of cattle left over. Quotations: Butcher steers, good, \$6.75 to \$7.00 medium \$6.25 to \$6.50, common \$5.00 to \$6.15, butcher heifers, good, \$6.25 to \$7.00, common \$4.00 to \$5.00, butcher cows good, \$5.50 to \$5.75, medium \$3.50 to \$5.00, canners \$2.50 to \$3.75, butchers \$2.50 to \$3.50, good, \$3.00 to \$3.50, common \$3.50 to \$4.50. Calf receipts 603. Good veals were very scarce and \$11.00 to \$11.50 was paid for a few of the best picked out. Ordinary quality sucklers were sold from \$5.00 to \$10.75 and grassers mostly \$5.00. Quotations: Good veal \$11.00 to \$11.50, medium \$9.50 to \$10.75, grassers \$5.00, sheep receipts 117. A few good lambs were sold at \$10.00 and common kinds and butchers from \$9.00 to \$9.50, sheep ranged from \$9.50 and \$10.00. Quotations: Ewes \$9.50 to \$9.00 lambs good, \$10.00 to \$10.25, common \$9.00 to \$9.50, butchers \$9.00 to \$9.50. Hog receipts 2,613. Hogs were brought in a basis of 12.00 flat and when graded this amounted to \$2.00 per hog premium on selecta and to 5 cent cut on shops. Sows sold for \$10.00.
