



Sir W. Robertson's Warning

General Sir William Robertson, Chief of the Imperial General Staff, made a striking speech on Wednesday evening at a village cross at Dalderby, near Horncastle, given by the Lincolnshire Chamber of Commerce in the village in the country which has sent the largest percentage of eligible men to the front from the time the war began up to April 30 last.

QUITE CONFIDENT.

On the whole we could look forward to the future without any anxiety whatever. He said that also because of the excellent spirit which prevailed at the front, there were to be found the men best able to judge of our prospects of winning. They were thoroughly confident that they would not be confident unless they themselves knew they were winning, and had the full confidence of those who were leading them.

He wanted to give a serious word of warning. They must be under no illusion as to the end, or the probable duration of this great struggle. They must be prepared to continue for a time which could not at present be estimated. In fact, we must prepare for the worst while we hoped for the best. There must be no slackening of our efforts. There must be a great tightening up. "We have adopted in theory the principle of national service. We must see that we put it into practice because we want more men, and we want them now, and eventually we shall want all who can be spared.

Every Man Wanted.

Exactly how this is to be arranged it would be improper for me to discuss. It is a question for the Government, whose serious attention is constantly engaging." He could say, however, that we were not justified in expecting to win this war unless the services of every man and woman in the country were utilised to the fullest possible extent. A full day's work was required of every man and woman, young and old—in the farm and in the factory and anywhere else—in order to set free the greatest possible number of men. Thousands had already gone. For the men required they were to some extent dependent on employers and local authorities, and it was necessary for them to realize the responsibility, and see that the army did not fall short of the men required to win the war in such a way as would give us such a peace as should compensate us, so far as it was possible, for the great sacrifices that had been made by all parts of the Empire. Therefore the cross had to be regarded, not merely as a witness of something already done, but what was far more important, as an incentive to greater efforts in the future in the prosecution of the war. In the interests of the Empire and of humanity and civilization in general, we were bound to carry through the war with unwavering and unflinching determination on our part.—(Cheers.)

EDITH WHARTON'S WORK IN PARIS.

The Committee on American Hostels for Refugees in Paris and Children of Flanders Rescue Committee, in issuing a report of their operations in Paris, says:

"Since the war began Mrs. Wharton, who has lived in Paris for the last few years, has worked heart and soul for the helpless refugees who have poured in from Belgium and from the invaded provinces of France; many recently from Verdun.

"Three large, empty buildings were turned over to her, and into them come more than three thousand men, women and children for their daily meals. Doctors and trained nurses help those who are ailing; there is a workroom where women may make or mend their own clothes or fill orders for needle work; there is a day nursery where the little children are made happy while their mothers work. These are the Hostels for Refugees, and they cost, with the utmost economy, about five thousand dollars a month to maintain.

"Most of the refugees are in extreme poverty, living huddled together in miserable lodgings; Mrs. Wharton has started a fund to provide them with decent furnished rooms at a moderate rent, and has established a depot for groceries at which food-tickets, carefully given out, may be exchanged for coffee, sugar, beans or rice at wholesale prices. Many stint themselves in order to send chocolate to their men, who are prisoners in Germany, as that keeps them better than anything else. There is also a depot where coal may be bought in small quantities at a reasonable rate.

"By the special request of the Queen of the Belgians, Mrs. Wharton has under her care about six hundred and fifty Belgian children, ranging from one year old to fifteen, and two hundred helpless old men and women, who were forced to fly, with the devoted nuns who cared for them, from the asylums where they had meant to spend their lives. Some of the children were in orphanages, others were picked up in ruined villages or on abandoned farms. One baby of twenty months had been living for five days, alone and without food, in a barn; two others, a little older, were taken from the arms of their dead father, killed by a shell while he was escaping with them. After they had been in Paris for a little while, two of the children were told, as a lesson, to draw a house from memory. Ten out of the twelve drew a house in flames. These children are now happy and contented, in three separate colonies, tended and taught by their Belgian nuns; besides regular lessons the older girls have lace-making classes, and a cooking and house-keeping school.

"Mrs. Wharton's fellow-countrymen in Paris have helped her generously with their time and money, and the French Government has shown its sense of the value of her work by decorating her with the Cross of the Legion of Honour—a distinction very rarely given to women. But much of her help has come, and must still come, unless all these helpless people are to suffer from this country. The Committee who represent her here in New York appeal earnestly to all those who are proud of her as an American author, and to all who believe she is doing good service now, to help her."

WESTERN PERSONALS

Ocean Depths.

The deepest regions of the ocean are commonly close to the shore and are believed to have been caused by the crumpling inward of the earth's crust due to the pressure of the near land. Such is the "Tuscarora deep," a long narrow trough which extends northward from Japan along the coast of Asia its bottom being more than 27,600 feet below the surface of the sea and 12,600 feet below the general level of the ocean's floor. An even more profound abyss is the Aldrich deep, close to the Tongan and Kermadec Islands, which sinks to a depth of 30,930 feet. The greatest yet found, however, is the Swire deep off Mindanao of the Philippines, his being 32,089 feet, or 3,089 feet deeper than Mt. Everest, of the Himalayas, is high. However, one gains an idea of the rarity of such abyssal regions from the fact that of the 9,750 sound-

ings that have been made and reported in water over 1,000 fathoms in depth, only seventeen were greater than 4,000 and only three exceeded 5,000 fathoms in depth. The greatest recorded depth of the ocean is only 409 feet more than six miles.—Scientific Monthly.

RUSSIAN EMBASSY DENIES COLONIZATION STORY.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—In an official statement today the Russian Embassy denounced as imposters any persons representing themselves as agents of the Russian government to arrange colonization of Pales in South America. No such colonization is contemplated, the embassy statement declared, adding: "Even putting aside higher considerations of friendship and duty to our brothers in Poland the alienation and loss of a million of them would be entirely contrary to the interests of the government and empire."
