## WESTERN TEACHERS

In Convention at Kensington.

### DECREASE IN SALARIES

Is Deplored—Some Excellent Papers are Read and Discussed.

The annual convention of the teachers of the Western Inspectorate was held in Kensington Hall at 10.30. After reading minutes of last year's convention and appointment of committees, the Pres. Mr. J. A. Ready, B. A. delivered an excellent opening address. He urged upon all the teachers the importance of attending convention and taking part in discussion. He pointed out that it would be a great convenience to convention meeting at this time of the year to have reports of the schools published earlier than at present for then the defects in teaching could be there pointed out by inspectors and others and might be made the subject of papers to be read before the convention and thus these defects might be removed. He urged upon all teachers the need of paying more attention to work in primary departments for in these days the foundation is laid and upon thoroughness of work done there depends very largely the success of the higher grades. He referred to the rapidly decreasing salaries paid to teachers and pointed out that they received \$11,000 less in supplements than they did five years ago. In conclusion he asked teachers for the hearty co-operation in making the convention a success.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

In the afternoon session after some routine business Mr. S. M. Bent of the Summerside Journal read a carefully prepared paper on "Some Phases of our School System." He thought the work in the schools was not practical enough. This is caused by small salaries and consequent loss to the profession of experienced and skillful teachers. He referred to the more important subjects to the exclusion of the ornamental. He urged teachers to get closer to Nature, to beautify the school room and grounds and not to make the schoolroom merely a place in which to hear recitations. Mr. Bent's paper, which was exceedingly well read, was discussed by the teachers, Mr. John Anderson of Kensington, Rev. E. Smith of Summerside, and Rev. E. Smith of Kensington, the general result of the discussion being to emphasize the importance of the teachers throwing themselves heartily into their work. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Bent for his very excellent paper. Miss Fairlie Durant of Margate, read an admirable paper on "The Treatment of History." The paper called forth discussion. The session then adjourned. There will be several papers read to-day. In the evening an entertainment was given, at which addresses were delivered.

## A NOTED CRIMINAL

Is Kept hand-cuffed in Amherst Jail.

### CONSPIRED WITH GILLIS

Of P. E. Island and others While Confined in Dorchester.

AMHERST, June 25.—James Campbell the man under arrest here on the charge of committing several burglaries in this country, has elected to be tried before Judge Morse, and his trial has been set down for June 28th. In regard to the prisoner's criminal record, your correspondent in a conversation with Detective Skeffington was furnished with the following particulars. About eight years ago the prisoner was arrested on the charge of breaking into the mines office at Springhill, then forcing a desk open and stealing a sum of money. He was held for the offence before Stipendiary Cullen and was sentenced to either one year or eighteen months in jail. The prisoner put in his time in the county jail here. He had only been out a short time when he was arrested by Detective Power of Halifax for burglarizing C. S. McLeod's store here. For that offence he was tried before Justice Townshend and was sent to the penitentiary for ten years. While at Dorchester the prisoner conspired with a man named Steele, who was sent there for an attempt to rob a bank and shoot the teller at Antigonish, with Jim, of Buck and Jim fame, 2nd with Alex Gillis, who was arrested by Detective Skeffington and sent there from P. E. I. for murdering Callaghan, the cemetery keeper, just outside of Charlottetown. The prisoner conspired to release the rest of the convicts in the penitentiary and was sent to Kingston for safer keeping. After serving about half his sentence the prisoner, Campbell, was released as a ticket of leave man. He was out only a short time when he made his way to these provinces again, and, as alleged, committed the robberies for which he now awaits his trial. With regard to the present detention of the prisoner in the county jail, he has been kept handcuffed every night and for some time during the day time. In addition to this he has been confined in the cell with a lunatic.
