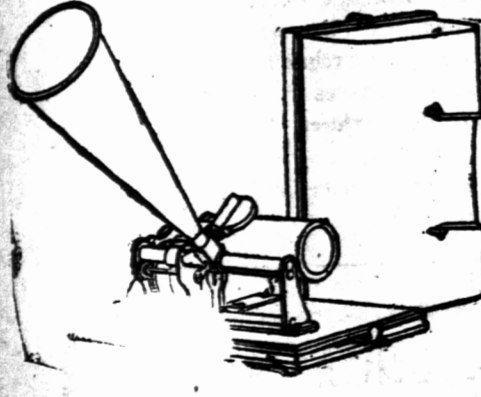

DAN PATCH THE KING OF PACERS.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 22.—Dan Patch made himself the king of pacers today by going a mile in 1.56 1-4, thereby clipping 3-4 of a second from the world's record, held by Prince Alert. The third day of the harness racing at the Memphis Trotting Association track was made memorable by Patch's magnificent performance in a trial against time. Beside making a new world's record, the son of Joe Patchen lowered his own record by two and three quarter seconds.

The mile was paced without a wind shield, and at the finish Dan Patch seemed as fresh and vigorous as at the start. The demonstration that greeted the new world's pacing champion as he flashed under the wire was a memorable one. Horse owners who stood about the track before the starters' stand had caught the time with their own watches and before the official time was flashed out across the track they set up a mighty shout and threw hats and caps into the air. The shout was caught up by the people in the grand stand, the space before it and on the club house grounds, and the victory of the new pacing idol was proclaimed in a long hoarse roar that rose and fell and reached its climax in a frenzy of noise as Driver M. C. McHenry pulled up before the judge's stand and doffed his hat in acknowledgement of the acclamation.

The trial was made with two runners to set the pace, the sulky preceding the pacer, carrying a canvas strip between the wheels. The quarter was reached in 29 seconds, the half in 58, and the three-quarters pole in 1.27 1-4.

As the horse swung into the stretch, Dan Patch was pushing the forward runner so closely that scarcely a hand's breadth intervened between his nose and the back of the driver in the forward sulky.
