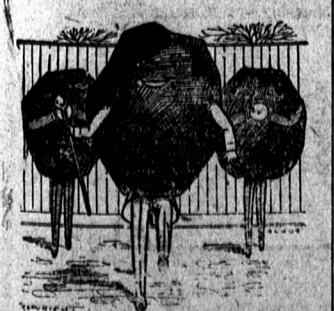

(Continued from page 10.) not completely and accurately defining how the status is to be created which gives the capacity to inherit. It does not undertake to prescribe who shall be considered a child, or a widow, or a husband, or what is necessary to constitute the legal relation of husband and wife, or of parent and child. These questions must be sought elsewhere. The evidence as to the law of Massachusetts in regard to adoption, and as to the validity of the Decree of adoption made thereunder in favour of the respondent and by a competent Massachusetts Court not being disputed, and the Decree being operative, I see no good reason in law or in fact, for not holding that the respondent is entitled to succeed to Mrs. Bailey's personal estate, as to which she died intestate whether at the date of her death, she was domiciled in Massachusetts or in Prince Edward Island. The appeal will be dismissed with costs and the case referred back to the Court below, to complete the administration of Mrs. Bailey's estate.
