### TRAWLER ON FIRE OFF ST. ESPRIT, FORTY MILES FROM SYDNEY

SYDNEY, July 30.—The French trawler Champagne, which left North Sydney at 3 p. m. Thursday for the fishing grounds, is on fire off St. Esprit, near Forchu, 40 miles from Sydney on the south coast of the island.

A message from the Champagne says her bunkers are on fire and that she is unable to cope with the situation. The cruiser Margaret has been despatched to the assistance of the Frenchman.

The trawler is owned in France and her local agent is E. LaCroix, French consul. She has been fishing out of North Sydney for about three months and bunkered there yesterday.

## Cures Reported At Ste. Anne Shrine

(Special to The Guardian.) QUEBEC, July 30.—A number of miraculous cures were reported at Ste. Anne de Beaupre today when the Feast of St. Anne was celebrated. It is estimated that between three and four thousand people visited the Shrine today. The number was considerably less than in former years but the temporary church which was erected early this spring was crowded when solemn grand mass was celebrated by Mgr. P. E. Roy, auxiliary bishop of Quebec, while the pilgrims took part in the open air procession in the afternoon and the solemnization of Vespers and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

Commenting on the reports of miraculous cures tonight, Rev. Father Leclerc said no outstanding miracles had been called to the attention of the Redemptorist Fathers. There were a number of marvelous cures reported, but there was nothing definite so far as all cures have to be thoroughly verified by the Fathers before they are accepted as authentic.

A number of cures have been reported within the past few weeks. One of them was the partial cure of Miss Rita Sinn, of Holyoke, Mass., whose spine was so badly affected that she was unable to stand. On the 18th of July she was partially cured. It is reported that Nora McCarthy, aged 7, years also of Holyoke, Mass., who since she was two years old, was likewise cured and has regained the use of her limbs, although she is still very weak.

William Morrison of Holyoke, Mass., is also reported to have regained the use of an arm while in the hands of the Redemptorist Fathers. Miss Yvette Beaudry of Shawinigan Falls, whose spine was affected was cured while receiving Holy Communion a few days ago.

## Dumping Gas Shells In English Channel

PARIS, July 30.—One hundred and seventy tons of gas shells today are being dumped by the French at present into the English Channel as the best manner of getting rid of them. Ever since the war ended these shells, some eight thousand in number—most of them British—have been lying in a depot in Northern France and have been regarded as no small menace to the peace of the district. How to dispose of them was a great difficulty. Now the French have decided to ship them 12 miles out to sea off Dunkirk and drop them into the water, at the bottom of which is a deep layer of soft mud. There will be no danger of any being washed up by the tides and if the poison gas does escape it will do no one any harm.
