THE Cacouna sailed during the latter part of last week having as a cargo a large quantity of oats, butter, poultry, hay etc. The following was shipped by Carvell Bros: 43,000 bushels of oats, 120 tons hay, 21,000 lbs of beef, 12,000 lbs mutton, 35,000 lbs turkeys, ducks and geese. Since the opening of navigation this summer, up till the present time, the firm of Carvell Bros. have shipped 465,000 bushels of oats, 875 tons of hay, 60,000 bushels of potatoes and large quantities of butter, cheese and other products. This is perhaps the largest shipment of produce ever made during one season in the history of Island commerce. The total amounts of the shipments are perhaps not equalled in Canada. These shipments are of inestimable benefit to the farmers throughout the Island and are a direct source of gain to them as they are thus enabled to secure a ready market for their various products.
