MAPLE CREAM GINGERBREAD

- 1 cup maple syrup
 - 1 cup sour cream
 - 1 egg, well-beaten
 - 2 1-3 cups flour
 - 1 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 2 tea-spoons ginger
 - 4 table-spoons melted butter
- Method: Mix together the maple syrup, sour cream, and well-beaten egg. Sift together the flour, soda, baking powder, salt and ginger, and gradually add this to the liquid mixture. Add the melted butter at the last and mix well. Pour the batter into a well-greased pan and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 30 to 40 minutes. Serve this warm with sweetened whipped cream. Good.

Canadian Legion Urges Speeding Home Defence

At a meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L. held yesterday afternoon, the following resolution was adopted and ordered to be sent to the proper authorities.

"WHEREAS, we believe there is a lack of recognition amongst our people of the seriousness of the war situation, as well as a lack of martial spirit, due largely to the absence of local opportunities or facilities for training.

THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Executive urge upon the authorities the necessity of providing some scheme for voluntary training for Home Defence, which will not only assure such defence, to at least some extent, but at the same time keep our people awake to a sense of national responsibility, and of the sacrifices they may be called upon to make.

FURTHER RESOLVED that we are of the opinion that many members of the Branch which we represent will be found both ready and efficient to act in such a Force if it should be authorized.

more expeditious routine. A great flood of departmental reports were tabled by the ministers several of whom received desk-pounding ovations. These were defence minister Rogers who arrived home from a tour of Canadian military camps in England and Allied lines in France, Hon. Pierre P. Casgrain, new secretary of state, and Hon. J. A. MacKinnon new minister of trade and commerce.

Huques Lapointe, who moved the address, is the 29-year-old son of justice Minister Lapointe who has been in Parliament since 1904, longer than any other member. His wife, mother and sister listened from the gallery.

He declared that youth would make the greatest sacrifice in the war and in the aftermath of war. Most of his speech was in French but he spoke a few minutes in English.

Those now overseas and those who will go have the right to expect that in return for the sacrifices they are making their government will act in such a way that their return will not be an unavailing one of their lot." Mr. Lapointe said. He urged that Canada expedite the business of repatriation since the country would be a rich prize for Germany if the Allies are crushed.

Mobilize Ruthlessly

Parliament had the power to mobilize ruthlessly the resources of Canada to the end that aggression might be defeated and peace achieved with victory, he said and the people expected those powers to be used.

Evidence of the government's intention to expedite the business of Parliament was found in the first issue of votes and proceedings shortly before today's sitting.

Notices were given of several resolutions including the elimination of private member days which customarily slow up government business in the first month of a session, and appointment of a Committee to consider how procedure rules may be revised to permit

Mr. Sinclair, a Rhodes scholar, paid eloquent tribute to the Minister, the opposition leader, Mr. Speaker and the late Lord Tweedsmuir, former governor-general of Canada.

He drew rounds of applause from all opposition benches when he declared it was the duty of Canada to make sure the Allied powers are given prompt supplies of the war materials they need from this dominion.
