City Council

At the regular Monthly meeting of the City Council the following reports were submitted:

POLICE REPORT
Presented by Councilor Holman for the Police Committee:
Forty-one arrests were made within the City limits during May for the following classified offences:

Assault on female, occasioning actual bodily harm—Arrests, 1; convictions, 1; dismissals, none; total, 1. (Two years in Dorchester Penitentiary.)

Drunk and Disorderly—Arrests, 9; convictions, 9; dismissals, none; total, 9.

Drunk and Incapable—Arrests, 19; convictions, 18; dismissals, 1; total, 19.

Disorderly Conduct—Arrests, 1; convictions, 1; dismissals, none; total, 1.

False Pretences (obtaining money by)—Arrests, 1; convictions, none; dismissals, 1; total, 1. (withdrawn).

Insanity—Arrests, 1; convictions, 1; dismissals, none; total, 1.

Vagrancy—Arrests, 9; convictions, 9; dismissals, none; total, 9.

Totals—Arrests, 41; Convictions, 39; Dismissals, 2; Total, 41.

In addition to the above arrests, there was one conviction for unlawful sale of revolver; one for carrying revolver without permit; two for common assault; six under the Sanitary By-law; one for allowing dog to be at large; seven for "speeding"; one for operating motor vehicle without permit; two for reckless driving; seven for neglecting to stop motor vehicle at "Stop" signs; and seven for juvenile delinquency. There were two convictions and one dismissal on charges for the unlawful sale of liquor.

On May 21st, the force collected 26 samples of milk from licensed vendors and delivered same to the city analyst for test. A storekeeper, whose sample of milk collected on April 29th last was found below test, appeared before His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate on May 28th, a fine of five dollars and costs being imposed.

The miscellaneous Fines and Costs collected during May amounted to \$315.46.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., June 8.—Mrs. Ella A. Boole, Brooklyn, N. Y., was elected President of the World Women's Christian Temperance Union in convention here today. Mrs. Louise McKinney, Claresome, Alta, was named First Vice President. Mrs. Boole is prominent as a prohibitionist leader in United States political campaigns, is presiding over the present gathering as Vice President, in place of Anna Adams Gordon, Evanston, Ill., who has been compelled by illness to relinquish the presidency after nine years service. Mrs. McKinney, at present acting President of the Canadian Union, has also taken a prominent part in politics. She was one of the Alberta women who appealed to the Privy Council to secure the right of their sex to sit in the Canadian Senate. Mrs. Emille J. Solomon, Cape Town, South Africa, and Miss Maria Sandstrom, Stockholm, Sweden, were re-elected as second and third Vice-presidents. SACKVILLE, June 9 (Special)—The annual sessions of the Maritime Conference of the United Church closed here Sunday in an ordination service in the United Church. A congregation which overflowed the edifice was present to hear the sermon of the moderator and to witness the ordination of 12 young men. Two of these intend to do mission work among the Indians in western Canada, one is under appointment to Korea and another to West China.

Rev. A. V. Morash, of Gagetown, president of the Conference, was in charge of the service, assisted by Rev. Dr. J. H. Philp, of Sackville, Rev. W. J. Swetnam, of Napan, N. S., and Rev. H. T. S. Gornall, of Saint John, secretary of the Conference.

Rev. Dr. E. H. Oliver, of St. Andrew's Colleges, Saskatoon, moderator of the General Council, preached the ordination sermon. The service was carried out by Mr. Morash, assisted by the moderator, Rev. Dr. Clarence MacKinnon, of Halifax, Mr. Gornall and the members of the various presbyteries.

Appointed Head Hydro Commission

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, June 8.—Succeeding Chas. A. Magrath, who retired several months ago, Hon. Robert J. Cooke, Minister without portfolio in the provincial government has been appointed chairman of the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario, while Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, former Prime Minister will act as a member of that body, Premier George S. Henry announced last night. Thus for the first time since the death of Sir Adam Beck, the commission returns to its original relationships with the government, with the chairman being also a Cabinet Minister.
