Many possibilities are shown in this smart blouse, where lace, crepe de chine and satin are all used. There is a fitted lining, over which the bolero of face is disposed, this edged all around with a bouillonne band having deeply corded edges, this in the crepe. The collar and chemisette are likewise of the lace, and a very piquant touch is afforded in the use of a mandarin blue satin to simulate waistcoat revers inside of the bolero below the neck, and also to furnish the deep swathed girdle that rounds downward in the front. The sleeve is entirely of the one-seam crepe de chine, and is simply a series of three puffs, separated by narrow bouillonnes, each having corded edges. A lace frill makes a pretty finish below the elbow. As a design for remodeling this has many points of excellence.

A STRONG LIBERAL KICK.

The Toronto Globe has not said very much lately on the subject of the Northwest schools but now puts forward a few words to show that its earlier disapprobation of Sir Wilfrid's school clauses is still unchanged. The Globe says: "Those who suppose that opposition to the educational clauses in the Northwest autonomy bills is confined to Toronto, and that it is dependent on Orange-ryism for its vitality, are living in a fool's paradise. The point of capital importance, and which cannot be disproved by shutting one's eyes to its undesired existence or by shouting bravely that it does not exist, is the unmistakable fact that not in Toronto alone, but in scores of centres throughout this Province the sanest and steadiest and most intelligent men cannot bring themselves to approve of the Dominion Parliament, on any pretext whatsoever, interfering in the educational affairs of the new Provinces. The men who made this objection are not Tories. They are not Orangemen. They are Liberals."

The cable tells that the other day the Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria publicly washed the feet of twelve beggars, the oldest and poorest men in Vienna. They were brought to the palace for the purpose, and we are told that the ceremony was attended by all the magnificence of the imperial court. The ceremony had its origin in our Saviour washing the feet of his twelve disciples, which, however, was done without the ostentation which in the modern imitation detracts so greatly from the merit and significance of the ceremony.

There are now many hundreds of grain elevators situated at Railway stations throughout the Northwest and in the towns, cities and shipping ports doing business in the grain trade. But the supply is yet far from equal to the demand. Hence we read that strong financial interests in Montreal contemplate the formation of a company with a capital of ten to twelve millions to construct from 300 to 500 additional elevators in the Northwest.

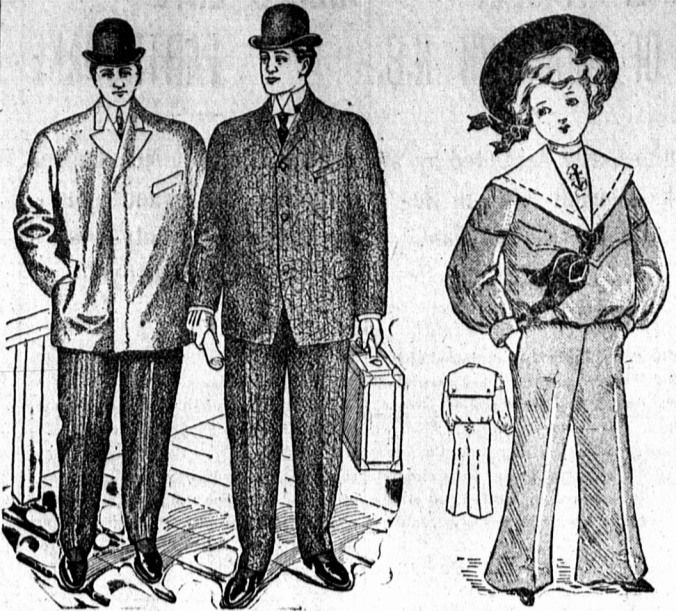
