THE STRONGHOLD OF RITUALISM.

Episcopal Church Where Purely Roman Catholic Service Is Held.

LONDON, May 2.—Is it a fact or only a rash statement of Nonconformists that Catholic dogmas and doctrines are rapidly being adopted in the English church? The visit of the special correspondent of The Daily Chronicle to the Church of the Annunciation, Brighton, a town which is regarded as the stronghold of English ritualists, would appear to settle the question most conclusively, for the correspondent referred to found that the service was a careful and exact reproduction of the Romish rite, thus disposing of the contention of Ritualists that there is no tendency towards Rome. The correspondent states that had he not known the church to be an Anglican one he should have been deceived.

A holy water stoup was placed at the door; there was a confessional box; and a large number of pictures—all, with the exceptions of the "Stations of the Cross," veiled in violet cloth to mark Passiontide—hung upon the walls while on altar-like structures stood images (also veiled), with flowers and candlesticks at their feet. On the gradine behind the high altar stood a tabernacle surmounted by a veiled crucifix, and flowers. On the second altar at the east end of the south aisle was a tabernacle, the door of which was covered with a silk veil as a sign that the Sacrament was reserved. A lamp, burned in front of the altar, and people passing genuflected to the tabernacle as what is called in Catholic churches a "throne" on which, at benediction, or during an exposition, a "monstrance" containing the Host may be placed.

THE SERVICE.

He sums up the omissions and interpolations in the service as follows:

Omitted—The Lord's Prayer, Collect, Ten Commandments and responses, Prayer for the Queen, Offertory, Sentences, "Ye that do truly."

Interpolated publicly—The Kyrie, Offertory "Hail Mary, etc.," Benediction, Agnus Dei, and "The Lord be with you" with its response (four times).

Interpolated privately—Practically the whole of the Mass, other than the small portions which occur to have counterpart in the Anglican communion service.

After the services which lasted an hour and a quarter, a sermon was preached on the Blessed Virgin Mary, from the text "The King's daughter is all glorious within."

He concludes: "One piece of information I obtained is, I think, more startling even than the service. It was told that it is the practice in the parish to give unction to the sick and dying. Confession is a matter of course; a notice at the times at which confession would be heard during the Holy Week was fastened on the confessional box."

Talks Against Christian Science.

Chicago May 3.—Dr. John Duncan Quackenbos, A. M. M. D., Emeritus of Literature at Columbia University and Barnard College specialist in nervous diseases and in an authority on neurasthenia and its treatment, has taken up the cudgel against the Christian Scientists. Dr. Quackenbos wields his cudgel as a medical scientist and in behalf of Christianity. In one of a series of lectures before the First Reformed Episcopal Church he dealt with the Christian Scientists in the following terms.

"Among the present foes of Christianity I reckon none more dangerous than the so-called Christian Society, which comes in the guise of a good Samaritan with metaphysical records for diseases in one hand and a mildewed theosophy in the other.

"Yet Christian Science treatment does relieve the sick. It quiets pain, cures certain disorders, and, moral, emotional, and the intellectual nature of those who trustfully submitted to it.

"The falsehood and the danger of the system are encountered in the barefaced endeavor of the impostors to prove a mission of divine origin and thus to bolster its authority by miracle-mongering.

"The method in vogue among Christian Scientists of treating the dangerously or hopelessly sick by appeal to the subliminal self are un-Christian and inhuman, so much so that repressive legislation is widely demanded for the protection of society from a legion of Christians whom existing laws do not reach and who are apt to assume responsibility for the most dangerous forms of disease and to trifle ad libitum with human life.

"Christian Science is but a jaunty theosophy which first places its dupes under obligation by relieving their physical infirmities and then takes advantage of their position to force down their throats its mystifying works—a sort of witch's caldron in which every conceivable heathen and Christian heresy is found seething and simmering to produce the subtle essence called mental medicine."



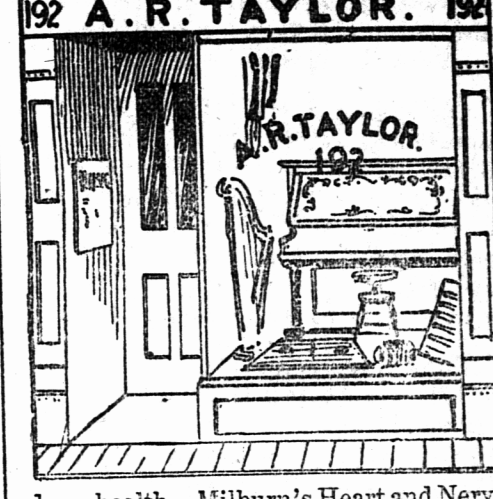

RELIEF IN WASHINGTON.

Feeling There That the British-Russian Agreement Has Removed a Threatening Element.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 2.—Lord Salisbury's speech relative to the agreement reached by Great Britain and Russia as to China was read with the greatest interest here. The prevailing sentiment is one of relief that by this agreement there has been removed an element that threatened to involve in hostilities two great nations with which the United States is desirous to live on the most friendly terms.

There is some curiosity to know just how the commercial interests of the United States are likely to be affected by this important arrangement. The highest official authority here does not accept the view set out in some of the British newspapers, that the United States has lost its chance in China; that the door is to be shut against us; and that we have deserved this exclusion by failing to substantially assist England in securing the open door policy as to all China.

It is said that so far as the English sphere in China is concerned, the United States will have free entry commercially, while assurances have been secured from Russia that United States commerce will be treated on terms of equality with Russian commerce in any portion of China that may come under her influence.

A SHOCKING CHARGE.

Negro Parson Makes Serious Charges and Preaches Race War.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 1.—The Rev. H. J. Callis preached last night at the A. M. E. Zion church, colored, on the racial troubles of the south. He said that the white women of the south had not protected their own chastity. He made a plea for the organization of the colored men said, that 2,500,000 were able to carry arms and predicted that, if the murders of colored men in the south did not cease, there would be a conflict between black and white men of the south. He said that his brethren in the south looked to the north for salvation.
