Red Strategy Aims at China's Key Cities
A map of China showing various provinces and cities. Key cities mentioned include Mukden, Tientsin, Peiping, Shanghai, and Nanking. S. military dependents are being evacuated and 4000 other Americans, 3000 of them around Shanghai, advised to leave.' 'Communist drive south of Yangtze River will divert Nationalist troops from defense of Nanking. If successful, Yangtze assault can become southern arm of pincers against Nanking-Shanghai area.' 'Having seized all of Manchuria from Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist forces, Chinese Communist armies threaten to overrun China proper. Map shows situation as Reds mass in Jehol province for pincers movement against the Peiping-Tientsin area and in Shaanxi province for 200-mile drive south against Nanking, Chiang's capital.'

EASY TO MAKE SHAMPOO JELLY
