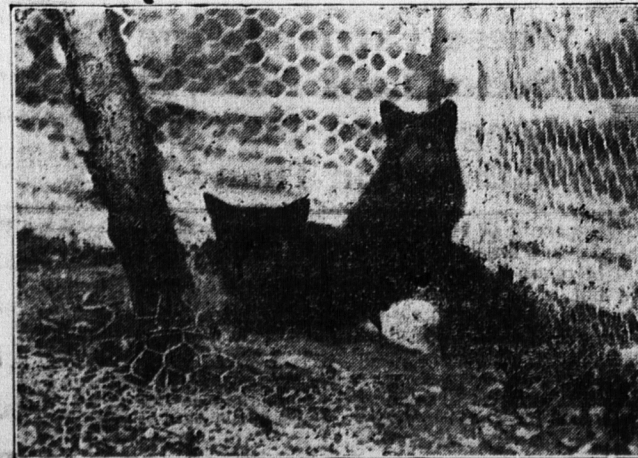

great quantities abound within easy reach of the shores.—Z.

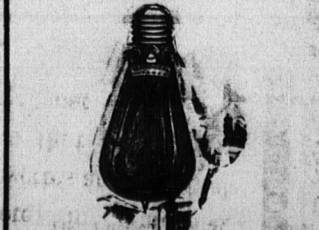
