## Registration And Marketing Foxes

### Value Of Fox Show Not Confined To Exhibitors, But Extends To All Concerned In The Industry

In today's issue of this paper may be found two advertisements of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association. The ad, on Canadian National Registration of foxes is one that deals with a subject deserving the consideration of Canadian Silver Fox breeders everywhere. If a business is worth operating at all it is worth operating well. At the present time when line-breeding for herd improvement is a recognized guide to suitable matings for the production of high class foxes—that the industry as a whole stands so much in need of—Registration, and that in a broad Canadian way, is a requirement for a breeders' intelligent and progressive operation.

Recent amendments to the Constitution of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association have removed restrictions and have thus made Registration more acceptable to many silver fox breeders, for example the annulling of the section which prohibited the keeping of other than registered foxes. Another concession now enjoyed is that a rancher is not required to get certificates for the

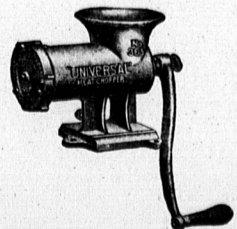
