A CAMPAIGN OF EDUCATION.

Sir Wilfrid Harcourt in a long letter to the London Times takes strong ground against preferential trade and especially the taxing of food in the British Isles which he claims would result. This is the great bugbear which is presented to the manufacturers, working men and the salaried classes. Nothing could be better fitted to arouse their prejudices. On the other hand the agricultural and land owning classes would not regard this feature as against their interests. It is not proposed that anything more than a nominal impost should be placed on foreign grain while grain produced in the colonies should be admitted free. This would moderately assist the home producer and at the same time stimulate grain-growing in the colonies and in that way tend to make the British Isles independent of foreign supply for breadstuffs. It might turn out that in case of war between Britain and Russia, or other of her present European sources of supply the British people would have much cheaper bread and much greater security than under the present system, but Mr. Harcourt leaves this contingency quite out of the account.

But an opposing leader usually feels that he can afford to appeal to popular prejudices, and the masses of the British people are extremely sensitive to the danger of a dearer loaf. Sir William has another specimen ground of objection in the point he raises when he asks Mr. Chamberlain to tell the people whether the Colonies are prepared to accept free trade within the Empire. This they certainly are not prepared to do. Canada would not admit British iron and steel free of duty, as such a course would be destructive to our own industries. But there is reason to believe that not only Canada but all the Colonies would be quite prepared to allow such a preference in the way of reduced duties on British manufactures over foreign ones as would fully compensate for any preference for their own products which might be asked for. This would be quite fair all around, and it is difficult to see in what way the interests of the United Kingdom would suffer by such a concession, while it seems apparent that the Empire as a whole might be largely benefited.

But it is to be observed that Sir William Harcourt has gone far beyond what

Mr. Chamberlain has at present proposed. He assumed in effect that it is proposed to change somewhat suddenly the old policy of free trade for one of protection. The Government leaders are certainly not prepared to join battle on such an issue at the present time. Their policy is one of inquiry, searching and exhaustive into the trade relations between the United Kingdom and the outlying portions of the Empire, with a view to ascertain in what manner these relations can be improved and the entire imperial structure benefited. Thereafter will follow a campaign of education which will bring home to the masses of the British people the facts brought out by the inquiry. This program seems to be judicious and statesmanlike. We think there exists at the present time a necessity for such an inquiry, and that it must in the end be fruitful of good results, whether it shall immediately lead to inter-imperial preferential trade or not. Too much light cannot be thrown upon this great question. An inquiry, in which the conditions and trade policy not only of Britain, but of India and the Colonies will be included, will necessarily prove not only enlightening and informing, but must create additional interest between the various sections of the Empire. And this seems in every way desirable.
