Sergt. J. M. Ahearn writing from England to The Guardian says: Shoreham-by-Sea, England, Aug. 23, 1917.

Dear Sir:—A new draft for the 26th Battalion has been formed with sixty of the 105th Battalion who were at Shoreham-by-Sea with the 13th Canadian Reserve Battalion since the 105th Battalion was amalgamated with the 104th. The boys are somewhat tickled to get away, and to know that they are getting to France before the rest of the boys who are in the 104th Battalion.

Now if the good people of Prince Edward Island wish to send them socks or tobacco, their address will be 26th Battalion, France. It seems too bad to think that our boys have to go as reinforcements for any other battalion than the 105th, because if all the available young men of the Island had done their share and enlisted so that there would have been lots of reserves to draw from, the old 105th would be together yet, but they did not so now we can go as reinforcements.
