**AIRMEN TO USE FLYING BOAT.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—One of the Curtiss flying boats recently tested at Hammondsport, N. Y., has been ordered by the army. It will probably be delivered within six weeks and tested out at the hydro-aeroplane station at the War College. Several of the aviators have made trips in new war crafts and feel sure that it will meet the requirements of the army.

Probably an army hydro-aeroplane station will be established on the Pacific coast. It has been practically established that when the aviation school leaves Washington for its winter quarters, the land branch will go to Augusta, and the hydro-aeroplane branch to the west coast. Lt. Colonel L. E. Goodier, Jr. Coast Artillery; Lt. Joseph D. Park, Fourth Cavalry, and Lt. L. H. Breton, Coast Artillery, have reported to the army aviation school for duty. Lt. Theodore G. Elyson of the Navy Aviation Corps at Annapolis, will make a flight to Washington, down the Chesapeake Bay and up the Potomac River, a distance of 155 miles.

Before his departure to take up his residence in Antigonish, His Lordship Bishop Morrison was presented by the parishioners of Vernon River with the following address which was accompanied with a good purse.

To the Right Reverend James Morrison, D. D.

Bishop of Antigonish.

May it please Your Lordship:—The parishioners of St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, can not allow you to pass from their midst without giving you a token of their love, esteem and veneration towards your person, and to give expression of how keenly they feel the separation.

We duly appreciate your humility and modesty, which have always been such prominent traits of your character, and we would hesitate in our tep, indeed, did we not deem it a sacred duty to give expression of our feelings.

During five years we have been linked together by the strong filial ties of devoted children to their beloved pastor, and we vainly would desire that these ties would long endure, but God has willed otherwise, and in following the lessons you have so often taught us, we humbly submit to the Divine Will.

For years we had followed your distinguished career as Rector of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, and witnessed the wonderful work you were doing for Religion, so that when you were named pastor of St. Joachim's Parish, we recognized that we were significantly honored in having so distinguished an ecclesiastic at our head.
