LIEUT. L. H. PARSONS SEVERELY WOUNDED

It has been officially reported that Lieut. Lloyd H. Parsons, R. F. A., has been severely wounded and was admitted to No. 8. General Hospital, Rouen, August 12. Lieut. Parsons who is an old McGill student has written to one of the university staff a most thrilling account of a recent aerial combat in which he took an active part and from what he barely escaped with his life. He graduated from McGill in 1915 with the Bachelor of Architecture degree and is the eldest son of Allan Parsons, Dorchester Street west.

He was shot four times, and his engine disabled but managed to plane down safely before collapsing.

This is his own story: I was zooming along behind the formation about 10,000 feet up, with a thick ground mist when suddenly I saw a commotion starting in front of me and we seemed to be going up, and down all over the place and then I saw there was a man in front of me with a beautiful black and white Boche. I tried to fire at one that zoomed above me, then one shot passed before I could fire and finally I got a crack at one. In a short time I felt lost in a big bunch of machines going every way and couldn't tell which was ours without a good look.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND FIRST EGG LAYING CONTEST

To be held at the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, commencing November first, nineteen eighteen, and continuing for eleven months until September 30th 1919.

(Rules and Regulations)

This competition will be known as "The First Prince Edward Island Annual Egg Laying Contest." It will be conducted on the Experimental Farm at Charlottetown, and under the direction of the Poultry Division of the Experimental Farm.

Board of Management. The board of management will be, The Dominion Poultry Husbandman, R. D. L. Bligh, B. S. A., Experimental Farm, J. G. Morgan, Superintendent of Contest; and W. Ker of the Poultry Division, Live Stock Branch.

Scope and Number of Entries. The contest will be open to all. It will consist of 20 pens of 8 female-hens or pullets. The first twenty bonafide applications received will be the twenty accepted. Contestants will be privileged to maintain throughout the year a full complement of eight birds. No males will be included.

Fees. The entry fee for each pen will be One Dollar (\$1.) which must accompany the application.

Prizes. Suitable prizes will be awarded the winning pens.

Classes. There will be two classes. Class 1 consisting of the Light Breeds and Class 2 consisting of the Heavy Breeds.

Delivering the Birds. The birds must be delivered at Charlottetown, express prepaid, between the fifteenth and twentieth of October, nineteen eighteen. The shipment should be addressed "Laying Contest, Experimental Farm, Charlottetown" and must also have the name and address of the shipper plainly marked on the shipping crate.

Rejection of Birds. Any birds arriving in a sick condition may at the discretion of the Contest Superintendent be rejected and either destroyed or shipped back to the owner. None but pure bred birds will be accepted and only those breeds that lay a marketable sized egg. The Superintendent also will have the right to clip the wings of any birds that may prove troublesome.

The Standard for Judging. The rating of the birds or pens will be determined by the number, together with the size, the uniformity and marketing value of the eggs. The Canadian standards for eggs will be adhered to.

Feed and Care. The birds while in the contest will receive the best of feed and care, but this will be subject to the judgment of the Board of control. The eggs from all will be the property of the Government and will go towards the cost of feed, but each contestant will be entitled to the record of each bird he has in the contest and to a statement showing the receipts and expenditure of his pen for the eleven months.

Housing. The contest will be housed in double colony houses 10x12 feet and divided into two pens having glass and cotton fronts. The houses will be placed on the Poultry Plant of the Experimental Farm facing the Railway as it runs through the farm.

Reports. A summary of the standing of each pen in the contest will be compiled at the close of each month, a copy of which will be supplied the owner of each pen. The summary will also be provided the press of Canada.

Return of the Birds. If no notification as to the disposal of the birds has been received by September 1, 1918, the birds on the completion of the contest, will be sent by express collect, to owner's address from which the shipment was made.

"THEY'VE GOT MY NUMBER"

"Suddenly I felt something go through my back and out my chest and something seemed to burn my ankle for a moment and I said 'Good night, they've got my number. I put her into a spin and waited for the ground to come up. It seemed a long time, I could feel some one firing at me all the way. At last the ground appeared right under me and I flattened her out just off the ground, with the Boche still popping me. My engine was stopped all the way so I could hear. I couldn't tell where I was when I landed. I was hanging by my high boots as I had landed her on her nose and believe me I cursed those boots. At last I got out of them, threw my goggles and gloves on the bar and looked around.

"I was breathing short and didn't know how long I was going to last so I slid on to the ground and not a soul in sight, then a head appeared and I walked in that direction up a road beside a wheat field and cried out 'Je suis blessé' as I was all in and couldn't breathe lying down.

"To cut it short they made me keep out of sight in the wheat (this was 6 p.m.) until the stretcher bearers came. They carried me through bullets, gas shells and we had to take cover numerous times. Eventually at three the next morning I arrived at a French hospital, where they could not speak English and I was the only English person, for the first few days. Until the bullet was taken out of my chest I couldn't eat, drink or smoke. I am feeling pretty perky now, however, and think I'll soon be flying again."

Lieut. Parsons above referred to is the grandson of Mrs. R. T. Holman, Summerside. He was born and spent his boyhood in Summerside where he has many friends who will heartily congratulate him on his thrilling escape and with a speedy recovery.

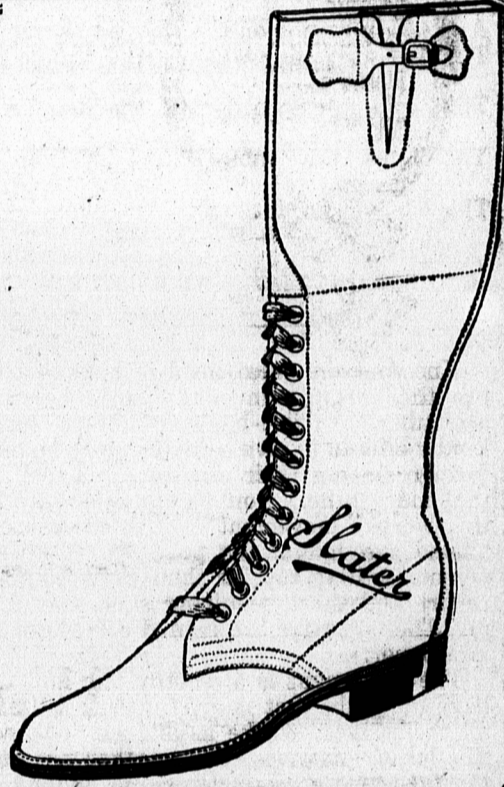
