THE Dominion Atlantic Railroad Co. is said to have in view the building of several new vessels, including two twin screw steamers, with a capacity of accommodating 1,000 passengers each. One would be placed on the Yarmouth and Boston route, and the other would ply along the south shore. Some of the vessels, also, would take a new route, namely, from Halifax to New York.—Monetary Times.

MORE OR LESS.—Returning visitors to the Maritime Provinces say that the activity in every branch of business there is enormous, especially in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island. Every hotel, boarding house, and lodging-house has been filled to overflowing, the verandahs being almost in constant demand for sleeping purposes. In Sydney, 3,000 new houses are in course of construction, and there are between 3,000 and 4,000 men employed at the new steel works.—Monetary Times.

A Reform in Building.

The "Little Red School House," of former years is fast being displaced by more modern structures, better adapted for the work of teaching and training the youth of our land. Great changes have been made in public architecture, and the building of to-day is as far in advance of that of former days, as the college is of the public school.

Not only has advance been made in public school architecture, but Sunday-school architecture has also made rapid strides. Instead of "trucking" the Sunday-school away in the cellar, or some other out-of-the-way place, the Church is beginning to realize that in the Sunday-school is the future Church, (as 85 per cent. of its additions come from the Sunday-school), and that it is entitled to better quarters and more modern conveniences. Consequently there has been a reform in Church architecture, and they are now being built with some thought of the Sunday-school. The Sunday-school building of to-day is one that can be easily thrown into the Church auditorium by sliding doors; built with a gallery, having class rooms up stairs and down, and so arranged that the platform of the Superintendent can be seen from any section of the room. This Sunday-school architecture is one of the out-growths of the International Sunday-school Convention, which through its various conventions, suggests methods and plans for upbuilding and strengthening the Sunday-school work of the whole country. New York Central Report Shows Gross Increase in Earnings of \$6,438,976.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—The Vanderbilts have had one of the most prosperous years in their history. Their railroad lines have coined money in every direction. The last year has added many millions to their wealth, according to the annual report of the New York Central Railroad, issued yesterday.

In 1900 the gross earnings of the great system were \$54,592,953 against \$48,124,016 for 1899, an increase of \$6,438,976. The net earnings of the road increased over \$2,533,507.
