Mrs. Asquith Hears Husband's Eloquent Speech

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, Jan. 19.—The most delighted person in the House of Commons yesterday when Mr. Asquith made his triumphant speech was his almost equally famous wife, who could scarcely restrain her delight and with difficulty held back her applause as the former Premier made his telling points. Mrs. Asquith as seated in her place on the ladies gallery which nearly half a century ago used to be occupied by Mrs. Gladstone when her husband made his great orations. Among those who also listened with eager interest to Mr. Asquith were the Prince of Wales, and Duke of York, both of whom showed amused appreciation at the sallies of the man who was Britain's Prime Minister when war broke out.

Mr. Asquith's speech was admittedly one of the finest he ever delivered and certainly had the effect of converting many doubting Liberals who were elected after a string of years of the polls against the Labour party, but who almost invariably vote Monday evenings with the Labour number. Liberals who will not vote with their party dwindled to about five and this is largely due to Mr. Asquith's efforts.

Company is still vested in the Dominion. The Prairie Provinces demand that these lands be given to them and the Federal Parliament that has already presented an Empire to Ontario and Quebec, is apparently desirous to gratify them. The two big Central Provinces have all the lands they want and stand ready to do the handsome thing for the Westerners. The King Government is in the market to buy political support and we can imagine the price they might pay in lands judging by the millions of acres to purchase two seats in Halifax and Kent. Secret conferences have been held between the King Government and influential Westerners and we can only guess what may have been already agreed upon. What we do know is that there will be 70 Parliamentary seats from beyond the Lakes when the Redistribution is shortly made and the Westerners want those lands!

What we further know is that those lands are partly ours by every principle of justice and equity; that a colossal wrong was done to the Maritime Provinces when Ontario and Quebec did us out of our rights in their huge Land Grab of years ago; that a second like partition, similar to the second partition of Poland, is easier made than the first because of an unrighteous precedent; that we have few defenders of Maritime Rights in Parliament, because the solid Fifteen Liberals from Nova Scotia and the solid Four from Prince Edward Island will neither say nor do anything to embarrass the Government. Maritime Rights are based on many Wrongs that cry out to be righted and among these Wrongs, past and prospective, there is none more gross than the Land Grab above outlined.

After his ordination in 1862, Mr. Allen was stationed by the conference at Greenspond, Nfld., a place whose morality at one time was so low that it was nicknamed "The Sodom of the North." But due to the work of Mr. Allen, who was the first minister stationed there, and of his successors, it became a flourishing centre of Methodism with several large churches.

Subsequently he was minister in a number of circuits in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, among them being Andover, Bailey, Verte, Sackville, Bathurst, Richibucto and St. Andrews.

In 1916 he came west, where he supplied pulpits in Saskatchewan and British Columbia, among them Ladner and Peachland.
