The Kipling Hoax As recorded in recent cables, Rudyard Kipling had one of the surprises of his life and probably one of the most unwelcome when he read recently in the London Times "The Old Volunteer" with his name signed to the verses. It was an audacious hoax by a wag who was also an expert forger; and Mr. Kipling at once telegraphed to the Times that he was not guilty. The Times excused itself by saying that Rudyard Kipling does live at Burwash, Sussex; that the envelope containing the lines bore the Brighton post mark; that the writing and his signature were wonderfully like Mr. Kipling's; that the verses were "not without merit"; that the Times regretted having been misled, and that it was "investigating the forgery." But how many of the thousands of Kipling's admirers, familiar with his work and style, must have read these lines in the Times with open mouthed amazement and rubbed their eyes again and again wondering what had happened to their idol! The lines follow, as they appeared in the Times: The Old Volunteer. I can hear the bugle calling And it won't want me While the superannuation-chap O' Germany 'S a-fighting for the Kaiser in His Fatherland; But our order's for the young 'uns O' the old Brass-Band. We were ready in the 'nineties When the call rang clear For the yeoman and the gentleman To volunteer, Awaiting for the enemy On nine days' drill; But the Army wants recruits, Not the old Free-Will. We can stay a long duration, Though the doctor said How "The Office" would be worried when You drop down dead"; But there'll be a better Judgment for The Last Relay; I shall bear the bugle calling, And I'll march that Day.
