Church Services

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

(Rev. Neil Herman, B.A., Preaches to Crowded Church.)

The services at the Central Christian Church yesterday were of particular interest in that the congregation welcomed back to its pulpit their former pastor, Rev. Neil Herman, B.A. The church building was crowded to capacity to hear Mr. Herman preach an eloquent and inspiring sermon on the subject, "The Three Greatest Questions Ever Asked."

The texts selected were Gen. 3:9, 1 Kings 19:9. "Where are thou?" "Where is thy brother?" "What doest thou here?"

"The Church is asked to surrender to a world ephemeral and as shallow as it is ephemeral. Young men and young women are asked to haul down the flag of the Christ life and surrender to the passion and the cheap show of the shallowest kind of a life. You are called upon to-day to send back an answer that will show to every one around you that you know how to live and how to die. The cross in your life is the one unanswerable challenge to the worlds call for retreat."

At the close of the discourse Miss Barbara MacNeill sang with exceptional feeling and fine color "He Was Nailed To The Cross."

At the morning service the pastor, Rev. W. L. Outhouse, B.A., occupied his pulpit and preached an inspiring sermon on the subject "Things That Are Loyal." Mrs. J. J. Stewart sang at the morning service "Softly and Tenderly." Mrs. Stewart sang with her usual sympathy and fine interpretation.

Mr. Outhouse announced yesterday that united services would be held

with the Baptist congregation beginning the first Sunday in August and that during the month of September the Baptist congregation would worship with the Central Christian Church during the first four Sundays in September. This arrangement is in keeping with the united services with the two bodies last summer.

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

Rev. Dr. Ramsay preached at both services yesterday. In the morning his text was "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the Sin of the world." In these days of glorious beauty in nature with the starry heavens above there is a danger of familiarity. The glorious may become the common place. We use the great words of our religion and familiarly with them tends to dull our perception. It is said the modern mind has lost its sense of sin. What does it mean that Christ takes away sin. Sin is a condition of the soul. It is what we are. It is a wrong attitude to life and to God and to other people. It is the will that thwarts His purpose for ourselves and others. It is the alienation of our spirit from God whereby harmony is broken and fellowship with him in all he seeks to do in us and through us is impossible. The only way that sin can be removed or taken away is by something that changes us at the heart, altering our whole outlook will and purpose so that we are brought into fellowship with God. We become new from the centre of our being—born again. This is made clear in the parable of the prodigal son. He was untrue to his nature as a son but he "came to himself." He got a vision of his father's love and goodness. In his restoration to fellowship with the father two things happened which are the reality of taking away sin. First the sense of guilt was made impotent to
