ASKS TOMATO BAN BE INVESTIGATED

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Aug. 26 (CP)—H. St. George Butterfield, chairman of Bermuda's agriculture board, has suggested the appointment of a committee to investigate the ban imposed by the Canadian government on the import of tomatoes grown in Bermuda and the Bahamas. For many years, Mr. Butterfield said, Bermuda had exported tomatoes to Canada and had earned a considerable income by doing so. In 1935, about 1,375,000 pounds of tomatoes, worth about \$68,000, were exported to the Dominion. Although he realized Canada might have reasons for imposing the ban, he said Bermuda was a good customer for Canadian goods and produce "to the extent of thousands and thousands of dollars." "The matter affects the economy of Bermuda," he added. The money this year has a large surplus of the fruit.

TRURO, N.S., Aug. 26 (CP)—Thomas Kennedy, international vice-president of the United Mine Workers, said today the Glace Bay Gazette was not in "good shape." Replying to a U.M.W. convention delegate asking if he had any information on Canada's only labor daily newspaper, Mr. Kennedy said the plant was not modern enough for a daily. It was too isolated for general circulation and could not depend on national advertising. It was a costly proposition, he said, but was of local concern to district 26. "It might be worked but it seems to be a financial flop." "There will be a full-dress debate on the Gazette, sold by the U.M.W. this year to a group of employees, before the convention ends."

Literature And Life

By BOOKMAN CHAIN-STORE MENTALITY

Some time ago the Rev. F. W. Sockman of New York addressed a body of church people in Toronto and took for his subject, "Chain-Store Mentality." He spoke very plainly and put in a word for the cultivation of individuality. Of the clergy he said many of them were "just managers of parishes, preaching ready made sermons." Long ago Cowper spoke of the "dry nurse of the church"—meaning the luxury that were available then in England. These are hard sayings, Sockman said that changes were far too frequent and that when "we enter a church we will build these as though we planned to stay there the rest of our lives." These are his very words. He gave the idea a wide application suggesting that the "chain-store mentality" was far more common than we think. In such a kind of organization orders are taken from the top—everything was managed from the outside. Those who carried out did simply what they were told to do, and yet we know that nothing counts for more in business than the individual. Have we not known some business that owed its unique character to the touch of one man, maybe its founder and leading genius. He may have begun by selling newspapers on the street or washing windows or sweeping the floor of an office, and doing these tasks as though the whole concern depended on them. But he did not stop there, for there were other rungs of the ladder to mount. He had heard that there was "room at the top too." So there is, for the reason that there are not so many there; the crowd is usually at the base. We have heard of the lad who worked in a store for seventy-five dollars a year and all the money went to buy books. But we find him later one of the leading educators of this continent, and sent abroad later to fill a diplomatic post. He was not the product of "chain-store mentality."
