Canada Has One Of Largest Battalions At Los Angeles, And Are Reported As Fit As Fiddles.

LOS ANGELES, July 29-Canada and the rest of the world go on parade tomorrow, opening the Los Angeles version of modern Olympic Games renewals in the largest and most elaborate stadium since the ancient Greeks originated the game in 800 B. C.
This 10th modern Olympiad, attracting 2,000 athletes from nearly 40 nations, thousands of visitors from all parts of the world, is to be inaugurated with a grand "parade of nations" before the eyes of 108,000 who will crowd into the giant athletic bowl called the Olympic Stadium.

A Large Representation
One of the largest battalions of men and women here, Canadians, will be well back in the parade, led by P. J. Mulqueen, chairman of the Canadian Olympic committee; M. M. Robinson, committee secretary, and W. H. Fry, chairman of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canadian athletes and 20 officials. They will wear blue blazers, white flannel trousers and soft white hats.
But back of them will march a crimson jacketed body of 130 Canadian athletes and 20 officials. They will wear red blazers, trimmed with white, white flannels and white hats. The girls will wear white flannel skirts. Every country's delegation will be distinctly dressed.
The long parade will journey once around the cinder track infield and then the athletes will take the Olympic Oath. Speaking from the official box in the main stand, Vice-President Charles Curtis of the United States will declare the contests open.

Powerful Field
Heats of the 800 metres bring out a powerful field, including Alex Wilson, Canada's greatest middle distance runner, Phil Edwards and Eddie King, Hamilton. Edwards may have to finish third in a field that is composed of Dr. Paul Martin, of Switzerland, Ray Benning, of United States; R. Keller of France and five others if he is to get a place in the semi-finals. Wilson's most dangerous foe is Dr. Otto Feister, one-time German world King meets an outstanding favorite to win the event, Tom Hampson of Great Britain, and the world's record holder, Sera Martin of France. Two Canucks, Jack Portland and Duncan McNaughton, are entered in the high jumps Sunday, and Cliff Bricker, Galt veteran, will be a starter in the 1,000 metres.

Canadians Fit
The Canadian team was pronounced fit for action today. Opening track and field events are slated for Sunday when Percy Williams and Lord Burghley, two of the most famous trackmen here, start the task of defending their titles. Seven first-round heats and four

Silver Doctor, the beautiful dappled grey pacer owned by the Mt. Edward Farms, Charlottetown, is becoming a real good gaited pacer that looks as though he will be heard from later on. Last Monday he stepped a mile in 2:19 with the last half in 1:07.

The fastest miles of the season over the Charlottetown Driving Park track, or in fact any track on Prince Edward Island, were the miles registered by Darcy Grattan in 2:10 1/4 and 2:10 2-5.
Neil Frisco, 2:03, to whom we have devoted considerable space in this column, has been going great guns, we understand, at North Sydney and recently paced a trip in 2:08. Neil when just right could take the best pace in America into camp over half mile tracks.

Darcy Grattan, 2:02, is getting right in the pink, as would naturally be expected when trained by Johnny Conroy. Johnny is a quiet going trainer not given to anything sensational, but once in a while he lets his charges step in a manner that impresses. For instance those clocking Darcy Grattan, 2:10 2-5 were under the impression that he had many seconds left. They are now talking 2:06 or 2:07 for Darcy Grattan at Charlottetown on August 24th.

Dr. Lee McIntosh of Hartland, N. B., has a great hobby for horses and has a beautiful farm where colts are brought up and given extra good development by means of good food. He has two or three of his own raising in training now and two of them will likely be started in Montague and Charlottetown.

Peter N. Dillon is a pacer which the Doc campaigned a little last year and he showed he was a good four year old by pacing in 2:14 at Houlton. It is expected that he will start in the 221 pace at New Annan and Montague, August 10th.

The many friends of Mr. William Wright, owner of Conn Frisco, 2:07, Zymri, 2:08 1/2 and other good horses, will be glad to learn that he has fully recovered from the severe shock and strain of that deplorable automobile accident which occurred on return from Saint John two years ago. It will be remembered that Mr. and Mrs. Wright left Saint John after the race and when just within a few miles of their own home an accident occurred which was the cause of Mrs. Wright's death.

When the entry blanks are opened by Secretary Boulter there will be a name missing that will cause a pang to those who had the pleasure of knowing the man. G. Herbert Foss, who was for years a patron and friend of Monte Gerow, passed away this spring at the early age of forty-two years. He was a big man in the Pine Tree state and commanded hosts of friends and every walk of life. He devotedly loved horses and shared ownership with Monte at the time of his death in Del Volo, 2:10.

Speaking about fast miles trotted over our local track, I would like to recall to the boys a performance that occurred on a morning in August, 1930, when Con Frisco, 2:07, with Monte up, electrified those present by trotting in 2:08 1/2. Unfortunately an injury which he had received at Saint John came against him and prevented his showing that kind of step in the races the next week.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ballard's horses which are being trained and driven by Billy Hood, are expected here August 6th or earlier. They will likely take part in the races at Montague. Neil Frisco is Charlie's property while Flo Abbe and Abbe Worthy answer to the ownership of Mrs. Ballard.

All purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10. Entry fee 5%. Five per cent of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses, 4% will be deducted from the third horse and 3% from the fourth horse.

Six horses to enter, four to start.
All drivers must wear a driver's uniform that will be satisfactory to the judges.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5 percent, is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the Judges.

Eligibility based on N.T.A. money winning classification.
