RUSSIAN POLICY IN MANCHURIA

Is to Hold the Ground and Fight All Comers

Leading Officials of Russia in the East Hold War Conference—Prospects of War—Captain Dead.

RUSSIA IN MANCHURIA.
LONDON, July 8.—(Special)—Russian policy is believed to be to hold the present position in Manchuria including New Chwang and take no steps to avert hostilities with Japan if assured that Japan will fight unaided.

WAR FEELING GROWS.
The war feeling among the Japanese in the north is growing and intensifying.

OFFICIALS HOLD A WAR CONFERENCE.
KINCHAM, Manchuria, July 8.—(Special)—All the prominent Russian officials in China, Manchuria and Korea are attending a conference at Port Arthur.

BATTLE LINE CAPTAIN DEAD.
ANTWERP, July 8.—(Special)—Capt. Norman Smith of the Battle Line News died today.

He was a native of Woods Harbor, N. S. "I don't give me my clothes." It seems strange, however, more than strange, marvellous that the prisoner did not allow to any one of these handier and saw that the shooting was accidental.

Taking up the defense of the prisoner the Chief Justice told the jury that the evidence was also carefully reviewed and evidence given by the witnesses. This evidence was not disinterested. He says he was going to return the gun to Cecil Stewart from whom he had borrowed it. While at Stewart's for his clothes, deceased broke the gun. He then went to Pippy's for the second gun to give it to Cecil Stewart. He called at deceased's this time for the pieces of the broken gun which he also wanted to return to Cecil Stewart. When deceased came out he ran away and he explains how he fell, how deceased caught the gun and how the shooting took place.

If his story is true, it would be the jury's duty to find him not guilty. The story is not consistent with his own actions and is absolutely inconsistent with all the other important witnesses. It is a matter for the jury to say whether they will attach the same importance to his evidence that they do to the other witnesses. The Chief Justice said he could see how the jury might find a verdict of guilty or of not guilty but he could not see how they could bring in a verdict of manslaughter. He quoted the law in explanation of this and closed by pointing out that if there be any reasonable doubt after hearing all the evidence it was the duty of the jury to give the prisoner

GRAND OFFICER LEGION OF HONOR

Conferred by President Loubet on Three Englishmen

He Travels in King's Train, Inspects Royal Apartments and Lays a Wreath on Queen Victoria's Tomb.

THE LEGION OF HONOR CONFERRED.
LONDON, July 8.—(Special)—President Loubet, bestowed the decoration of Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor upon the Lord Mayor, Admiral Beaumont and Lord Avelbury, formerly Sir John Lubbock, this morning.

IN THE KING'S TRAIN.
The President and Foreign Minister Delcasse travelled in the King's train to Windsor Castle.

He was met at the railroad station by the Mayor and Corporation.

PLACES WREATH ON VICTORIA'S TOMB.
The President inspected both the public and private apartments and visited the Mausoleum at Frogmore where he deposited a wreath on Queen Victoria's tomb and subsequently returned to London.

All through the course of the addresses and the Chief Justice's charge to the jury the prisoner remained unmoved. He sat in the prisoner's box with his head against the back and apparently cool and collected.

It was just twenty-two minutes to twelve o'clock when the jury left the court room and a few minutes afterwards John Bell was brought forward in the custody of Joseph Harper and placed in the prisoner's box, beside Joseph Carver. The first indication against him for stealing was the property of Daniel McRae, who at once proceeded with

at 2.30 o'clock the count resumed and the name of the King's witness was called upon. A few minutes later the jury in the murder case filed into the court room, and the Master of the Rolls and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald took their seats beside the Chief Justice. The prisoner Joseph Carver was brought in and placed in the dock. The formal proceedings of calling the jury was gone through and then in reply to the momentous question of "guilty or not guilty," Foreman Essery replied solemnly "Guilty," with a strong recommendation to mercy. This verdict was duly recorded and the jury asked to listen to it as it was read over to them, and each responded when asked if it was the verdict of one and of all. So it was a unanimous verdict, as was necessary to make it a verdict at all. The prisoner received the verdict with a fair measure of calmness, wincing slightly when the word "guilty" was pronounced, and he seemed to realize what it meant to him. As he was being led away to jail the solemn and awful import of the verdict seemed to grow upon him.
