CANNING MARMALADE IN MID-WINTER.

Summer time is canning time as everybody knows. Nevertheless there are many preserves that may be prepared at this time of year. They are economical in two ways—they are made at a time when the home preserver is not rushed with other work of the same kind, and they are made from fruit that is in season and therefore fresh.

Orange marmalade is a standby in most households and when oranges are now at their cheapest and best is the time to make it. But remember that it is worth while to use good oranges. It does not matter if they are small. But they must be of good flavor.

Wash the skins thoroughly. It is well to use a soft brush to clean them with. Of course this brushing removes some of the oil, but there is much dirt usually on the outside of an orange, so do the work thoroughly and carefully. Wash the fruit to remove the dirt and leave the oil. Pare half the orange, taking off only the thin, outer rind. The white part of the rind is bitter. Cut this thin yellow rind into shreds and boil it until it is tender, changing the water twice in the process. Strain the rind from the rest of the oranges, just the same outside part. Then take off all the white part of the rind from all the oranges and cut them into very small pieces. Remove the seeds. Weigh and allow one pound of sugar for every pound of fruit. Drain the fruit in a sieve, without pressing it, and put the juice on the sugar and boil until clear. Add to this syrup the boiled shreds of skin and boil for ten minutes. Then add the grated rind and the orange juice and boil until a sample of it thickens when it is cooled. Put away in marmalade jars or small cans.

GRAPE FRUIT MARMALADE.

Grape fruit marmalade is also delicious and is as interesting to prepare as orange marmalade. To make it, wash six rather small grape fruit and wash them well. Then cover them with cold water and boil until they are soft. Be careful, when testing their softness, not to puncture them with a fork and so lose some of their juice. Drain the grapes and let them cool, and then, with a sharp knife, pare the thin outside yellow skin and shred it. Cut the grape fruit in half. Take out all the seeds and take out the pulp. Boil a quart of water and five pounds of sugar until clear, and add the rinds, twice if convenient. Drain the shells on a sieve and plunge them into boiling water for five minutes. Drain well again and then cut off the thin outer skin and shred it. Put into a saucepan over the fire with three cups of sugar, two of water, and enough of the syrup to cover the shells. Boil for five minutes, then add the pulp and boil until the mixture is thick enough.

CANDIED ORANGE.

Candied orange or grape fruit peel can be made at this time of year and packed in small glasses to use for several months to come. The pulp can be used for fruit cocktail desserts, and the halves of skin from which it is removed can be candied. Soak the shells in cold water for two days, changing the water once or twice if convenient. Drain the shells on a sieve and plunge them into boiling water for five minutes. Drain well again and then cut off the thin outer skin and shred it. Put into a saucepan over the fire with three cups of sugar, two of water, and enough of the syrup to cover the shells. Boil for five minutes, then add the pulp and boil until the mixture is thick enough.

APPLE PRESERVE.

Sometimes about this time of the year the housekeeper has on hand part of a barrel of apples that will not keep firm much longer. They can be made into preserves for this purpose rather tart apples of good flavor being preferred. Pare the apples, core and quarter them. Weigh them, and allow an equal weight of granulated sugar. To each pound of fruit allow the juice of two lemons, the grated rind of one and a cupfull of cold water. Boil the sugar and water for two minutes, and then add the lemons and apples, and simmer until the apples are tender. Seal in jars while hot.

ed two fugitives, who had been six days in the bush without food. You never saw two such bedraggled specimens of British officers. They were wet, dirty and torn, but they had smiles on their worn faces and loaded revolvers in their belts. They had evaded the enemy where they could, cut their way at the rate of eight miles a day, swam a river, and finally brought up on British territory and saw our launch approaching. We took them on board, gave them food, put them in the dinghy with some more and sent them down to Ikom. The following day as we were coming back, we found a whole section who had been with Rodwell, and refused to follow him over the river; they had made a handrail for those who could not swim. They had been a week out of

food. We took them on board, hauled down the flags of peace, twisted the ensign, and were soon back at Ikikom, which is our advanced base. Since the end of last month, I have been on the boundary with a small force of 160. The Germans have visited us several times, but have been repulsed.
