A valued subscriber in Battle Creek, Ia., writing to 'The Guardian' says: We are glad to see your stand on the vital question of the hour. I hope you will be successful in enforcing the temperance law. Don't yield an inch to the enemy, they will follow up every advantage gained. Enforcement of law is the difficulty everywhere. The same fight is here. What is wanted are men of backbone, who cannot be bribed, who regardless of party, stand for right. Iowa was a Prohibition State, in fact is still, with a municipal law passed by the Republican Party, giving each county the right if a majority of voters sanction it of having the saloon. Our town has two saloons each paying the town \$600 yearly and the State \$800 yearly, and it run according to law, would soon run to the ground, but when a saloon keeper will run according to law, indications of the millennium will be visible.

RECIPROCITY FAILURES. On October 29th 1875, the late Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, Premier of Canada, and the late Hon. James G. Blaine, ex-Speaker of the U. S. House of Representatives, were joint guests at a St. John. N. B. banquet. In the course of a memorable speech Mr. Mackenzie said: "A morning paper to-day said that it was an interesting coincidence that Mr. Mackenzie and Mr. Blaine should meet as guests at the banquet tonight, the one the head of a Ministry which initiated negotiations for a Treaty of Reciprocity, the other the head of a party which laid the Treaty on the shelf. It was suggested that we might meet and compare notes, and that perhaps we might be able to settle our account. Well, for my part, I may say to Mr. Blaine, 'I am willing to trade, but as it requires two to make a bargain, if you are not willing I must go somewhere else.'" Sir John Macdonald tried to make reciprocity the basis of a treaty between the two countries at a later date. He, too, failed and made the same answer, Sir Wilfrid Laurier likewise endeavored to secure a reciprocity treaty, and he, too, has made the same answer when he saw himself face to face with the conditions which faced Mr. Mackenzie and Sir John A. Macdonald, Next!—March Canadian Magazine.

DALHOUSIE NOTES.—On the evening of Friday, Feb. 20th, Rev. J. S. Carruthers of New Glasgow, N. S., lectured before the students on Hawthorne's "Scarlet Letter." Mr. Carruthers in his usual good style gave a dramatic impersonation of some of the most pathetic incidents recorded in the book. It is needless to say that the lecture was thoroughly enjoyed by all who heard it. On the previous evening Mr. Carruthers gave a lecture in Pine Hill on the subject, "The Development of the Drama from the 'Spiritual Nature.'" Mr. Carruthers traced the history of drama from its earliest form to the present development. Before closing he read some selections from the comic parts of Shakespeare. The lecture was a treat to all who were fortunate enough to hear it. The Dalhousie and Pine Hill students were very pleasantly entertained at an "At Home" in the School for the Blind on Friday evening, Feb. 20th. In the early part of the evening a concert was given by the pupils and teachers of the school. After this part of the program was over coffee and cake were served. A very enjoyable evening was spent by all. O. F. Fraser, principal of the school, and his staff of teachers are doing a noble work in teaching, in such a thorough way as they do, the blind children of our land. It is wonderful what a knowledge these children have of the various subjects on the school curriculum and also of music and other useful arts. When the parents are unable to pay the expenses of sending their children to this school they are given instruction free of charge. Mr. Fraser is anxious that all blind children in the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland should receive help from this institution and wishes that all who have any blind children or who know of any not being properly trained, would acquaint him of the fact that he might see that they are sent to the school where they will receive a good technical education. On the afternoon of Sunday, Feb. 22nd, Dr. R. A. Falconer of Pine Hill, lectured before the Dalhousie students on the subject "The Freedom of Christian Thought." Dr. Falconer contrasted the freedom we today enjoy as compared with the freedom of those who lived under the slavery of Pagan religion. Although we have passed away from the slavery of mammon and other false gods we who are the followers of Christ are still slaves—slaves to God—the living and true God. But in being slaves to Him we enjoy the fullest liberty possible to mankind. The lecture was able and interesting and much appreciated by all present.
