**TEMPERANCE VICTORIES ON CHURCHES, HOME AND PROVINCIAL FRONTS**

Rev. J. R. Mutchmor, D. D., Secretary, Board of Evangelism and Social Service, United Church of Canada at the Ontario W. C. T. U. Convention, St. James United Church, Peterborough, October 1st, 1947.  
The tide of events in temperance work has turned; temperance victories outnumbered defeats. On the church, home and provincial fronts, we have taken the offensive. The early results spell victory. We have turned from a policy of defence, often of flight, to a grand strategy of offence and fight. We have really begun to bring back the liquor evil. The citadel from which we attack is the Christian Church. Our first line is home life. Our objective is a temperance state or country, including a far more temperate minded and temperance acting province of Ontario. This province, long called the "banner province," has lost its banners. We will restore the temperance color to it.  
We begin with the church. Where are the temperance victories in the church? The answer is threefold. Her Temperance witness, her common temperance front, and her insistence that "as conscience of the nation" her views on temperance must be listened to, and be made the basis of constructive state policy and action.  
For All Protestant churches are in this fight now. The position of the Baptist church is well known. It bears a good witness. The Presbyterian Church Board responsible for its temperance leadership is well organized under Rev. Dr. G. L. Cowan of Hamilton. The Church of England strongly condemned Premier Drew's action in bringing back the old bar to Ontario in the guise of the cocktail lounge. The record of the Roman Catholic Church is a victory one. Ever since the late Cardinal Villeneuve and the archbishops and bishops of Quebec, some eleven years ago, said that "a good Christian does not drink" they have kept up a heavy attack on the liquor evil.  
The churches have achieved victory in common organization. When, in war time, Dr. A. J. Irwin organized an all-church delegation to wait upon Prime Minister King, to urge war-time beverage alcohol restrictions, he won a great victory. The statistics of reduced consumption prove it. Hard liquor drinking fell by 30 per cent. Subsequent increases, due to the federal government's war-time emergency powers, challenge the churches to new efforts. The churches remember that Premier George Drew led the attack for more beer. He won the opening skirmish on the Ontario front, but the churches defeated a similar move in other provinces. They will, in time, win a similar victory in Ontario, because they have a common front.  
The churches are marching on to victory because they are sure it is their right and duty to be "the conscience of the state." This position of the churches has been recognized for nearly 100 years in British history. It may lead some politicians to cry out against "troublesome priests" but the fact remains that the conscience way is the victory way. Its power for victory lies in its "word from the Lord," quality and character.

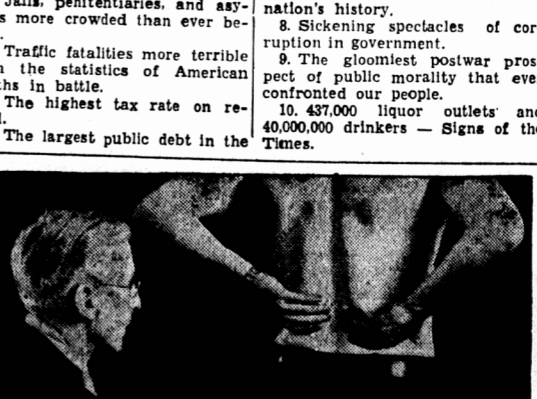
about 550 per cent did so at once. About 26 per cent stopped after a few relapses. Most of the other members have improved.
