

# Boys' Juveniles Win Maritime Ch'ship

The disastrous fire which occurred at Woodstock, N.B., Exhibition grounds last Tuesday afternoon not only destroyed the main building, barns, dance hall, offices, cattle and poultry sheds but caused the loss of two race horses and considerable racing equipment. Twenty horses mostly being trained by Earl Smith were unharmed from the blazing stables but two, one owned by L. M. Page of Ashland, Maine, were very unfortunately destroyed. Earl Smith's loss was a severe one as five of the several sets of harness and other racing equipment went up in flames. It had been planned to hold a race meeting at Woodstock and possibly an exhibition, this fall but the exhibition was cancelled and it is doubtful if the races may be held as there is no word of any damage to grand stands and most of the race stables were saved.

The wrong way of the track as we see it and mostly over grass courses which are being overgrown with time and the trotting and pacing races are patronized by enormous crowds and are of course very popular.

The Grand Circuit meeting at Groton's historic half-mile track which opened on June 1st will have a \$5000 Free For All Trot as a gala attraction.
