Assistant Jailor Cannon came along in time to notice one of the prisoners standing in the doorway thus opened, and prevented what might have been a general stampede.

According to the Jailor's report to the Supreme Court on Tuesday, there are sixteen persons confined in the Prince County Jail at the present time.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN BOMB VICTIMS

Incendiary Bombs Are Dropped on Daggah Bur—Selassie Nears Dessye.

(Associated Press Foreign Staff) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 29.—The Ethiopian government said today many women and children were killed when Italian airplanes bombed Daggah Bur, fortress on the Southern Front.

"Nine Italian planes dropped 1,500 bombs," said the communique, "mostly incendiary, on Daggah Bur Thursday, killing many women and children. A new church and many houses were destroyed by fire. "Four sick natives within the church were among the victims. There were no victims among the soldiers, who are trained to scatter in the fields every morning."

To Take Command
Emperor Haile Selassie, traveling by caravan, was expected to reach Dessye tonight. There he will assume personal command of Ethiopia's defence. Elaborate precautions were taken to protect the Emperor in the event of an Italian air raid. He was accompanied by more than 300 chiefs and priests.

Ethiopian said they did not know how long the Negus would remain at Dessye, headquarters between the northern and southern fronts. Some said he might remain there for the duration of the war and others that he might return, especially if reports of Ethiopian victories in the north are true.

Selassie's party, made up of hundreds of soldiers and numerous dignitaries travelling in 500 motor cars and trucks, bivouacked last night at Debra Birham after the German pilot, Weber, had scouted the area.

Among the dignitaries were Teclé Hawariate, taking up his military duty for the first time since returning from Geneva; former Minister of War Fituarari Birrow, recently reinstated to his command after he had fallen in disfavor with the Emperor; and six Belgian officers.

Youth Near Death As Result Of Drunken Brawl

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Nov. 29.—Jesse Livermore, Jr., 15-year old-son of Wall Street's boom-day "plunger," was feared near death tonight from a bullet wound authorities said was inflicted by his mother after a drunken argument. "It was an accident," the youth gasped as an opiate was administered. "That's all I wish to say about it. I'm too tired to talk now, anyway."

The mother, divorced second wife of the once famed market manipulator, was held under guard.

Dr. Neville Usher, administering physician, quoted Mrs. Livermore, the former Dorothea West of Brooklyn, N. Y., as exclaiming: "I've shot my boy."

Under-sheriff Jack Ross said both mother and son were intoxicated when taken to a hospital early today.

Outlines Attitude Re Central Bank

(C.P. Cable via Reuters by Guardian's Special Wire)

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Nov. 29.—Michael J. Savage, who will be called upon shortly to form New Zealand's first Labour government, today outlined the attitude of his administration towards the central bank of the Island dominion.

If the bank is taken over by the government as an entirely state institution, the 500,000 shares held privately will be taken over at market rates, he announced. There was no question of forcing sales at par and thereby involving the shareholders who purchased at a premium in a loss.

"It is not yet definite whether we shall interfere in the present constitution of the bank," Savage said. "Although opposed to the bank in its present form, as we wanted a state bank pure and simple, I see no reason why the present reserve bank should refuse to work with us. Personally, I would welcome its co-operation."

The Calf Club Show of the Dominion-wide Boys and Girls Farm Clubs at the Sherbrooke Winter Fair held recently was the largest assembly of its kind at a provincial exhibition. Two hundred and twelve Calf Club members from every district of the province of Quebec took part in showing 160 calves and yearlings and in the different judging contests for selecting teams to go to the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto.

Many of the farmers of Eastern Canada who fed Western lambs during the 1934-35 winter under the Dominion Lamb Feeding Project are placing increased repeat orders, in many cases asking for double the number of lambs they fed a year ago. The applications, particularly from Quebec and Ontario, reflect the abundant supplies of hay, grain, silage, and other crops in Eastern Canada.

LOBSTER CASE HEARD BEFORE SUPREME COURT

The case of the King vs George Gallant, Harry Perry, Elmer Gallant opened in the Supreme Court yesterday, Mr. Justice Saunders presiding. The forenoon was taken up with selecting the jury which is as follows: Edward Barbour, Foreman, Russell Thompson, John J. Harris, Harold Stewart, Leslie Smith, John MacPherson, Walter Barlett, Gedeus Gallant, Charles Colwell, Ray Bernard, Hazen Phillips, Sinclair MacKay.

Mr. L. G. Lewis opened the case for the Crown. The first witness called was Rennie Gallant who has charge of Paturel's factory. Witness stated that he worked at the factory of Andre Paturel on Queens Wharf for the last five years. He had been engaged all day Friday, October 18 taking smelts to the cold storage. He was last at the factory about nine o'clock that night and locked it up and left everything as usual. He went to work at eight o'clock Saturday morning but did not notice anything unusual about the place. He went to the cold storage during the morning and looked up the factory while he was away. On returning at 11.30, he noticed something wrong in the boiler room. He saw one box of lobsters was missing. On investigating further he found six boxes of quarter pounds were gone and four cases of half pounds. He at once notified Mr. Paturel of the loss. He also informed the R. C. M. P. and Chief of Police Kinch. On Tuesday they visited Mr. J. J. Hornby's warehouse in Charlottetown in company with Chief of Police Kinch and others, where witness identified the lobsters out of some 30 cases. He could tell the cases as they were marked with the letter L some had X in the corner to signify that they were not the best pack. They opened the boxes and found they contained enamel tins which are the kind used by Mr. Nat Gallant who had packed the lobsters for Mr. Paturel. Witness stated there was nothing to indicate that a break had been made at the factory.

Mr. James J. Hornby, Charlottetown was the next witness, who testified that he was a lobster buyer and had been in business for 30 years. He had received a shipment of lobsters at noon on Monday, Oct. 21st from Bernard Riley. There were 32 cases of half pounds and 67 cases of quarter pounds. They had not been moved from the warehouse, when on Tuesday evening, Mr. Paturel, Chief of Police Kinch and Rennie Gallant came and asked if they could look at some cases of lobsters. He told them to help themselves. Rennie Gallant picked out some cases marked with the letter L which he said were the ones that were missing from the factory. The lobsters would be valued at about \$23 for the half pounds and \$14 for the quarters. Witness also stated that enamel cans for lobsters were very rare. Lobsters are usually done up in plain cans. He only got these enamel cans from Paturel. Witness said that he bought lobsters all over the province.

The court then adjourned until Monday morning at 11 o'clock. Hon. Thane A. Campbell, K. C., and Mr. L. G. Lewis acted for the Crown, Mr. C. D. MacCallum and Mr. MacNaught for the prisoners.—S

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29.—(C.P.)—Newest candidates for the doubtful honor of "meanest thieves" have popped up here. Thus held up and robbed aged Mrs. Bertha Robb, almost totally deaf, of \$1 and her car phones.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—(C.P.—Havas)—The first filling station in England to sell gasoline made from coal was opened today at Gloucester Terrace, in southwestern London, by Tom Williams, Labor member of Parliament for the last 13 years.

ROME, Nov. 29.—(C.P.—Havas)—A man pronounced dead from embolism was brought back to life today through a difficult heart operation, performed by two Italian surgeons, Drs. Valdono and Stefanini.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(A.P.)—The United States government today claimed a victory in the dismissal of a federal court suit against the Utilities Act, but the legal bombardment of that statute continued unabated.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—(C.P.)—Canada will ship 4,000,000 Christmas trees to the United States in the next three weeks to decorate the homes of American families and gladden the hearts of thousands of children.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—(C.P.)—Government officials would not comment tonight on reports that John I. McFarland, chairman of the Canadian Wheat Board, had tendered his resignation, and that reorganization of the board would be announced shortly.

WESTFORD, Mass., Nov. 29.—(A.P.)—A shot gun blast nearly severed the head of Frances Gallagher, 20, as she lay in bed today, and to police chief John Sullivan her death appeared to be "more a murder than a suicide."

Stocks Hit Skids On Mt. I. Market

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 29.—Stocks skidded to lower levels on the Montreal Stock Exchange today as support was withdrawn in the afternoon after the list had held firm during the forenoon.

Power stocks led the late decline under the leadership of Montreal Power and a few constructions, textiles and golds were quick to fall in line. Golds were the only members of the group to show tendencies to recover before the close and this section held an irregular appearance at the final bell.

Steady pounding at Montreal Power sent it down to 32 1/2, from where it recovered to 32 1/4, down 1 1/4 from yesterday. Shawinigan and Power Corporation showed small declines and B. C. Power was off 1/4 at 29 1/2 despite declaration today of the regular quarterly dividend of 37 cents a share.

Canadian Car preferred moved contrary to the general trend, closing with a gain of 1/4 at 11 1/4.

Consolidated Smelters was one of the market's active leaders, touching a high early in the day of 210, a new record peak, and then declining to 206 before recovering to 200, up a point from yesterday.

Total sales were 28,660 shares; bonds \$16,800.

Shipments of feeder cattle brought from Western to Eastern Canada to be fattened under the Dominion Feeder Policy totalled over 2,000 head for the month of September.
