The man in the case is said to be Alexander Chisholm, a former fireman of the Intercolonial. Chisholm returned home last week. Later he quarreled with his mother, and in a fit of insane rage threw her down stairs, kicking and beating her to death. He is now in the County Jail awaiting a preliminary hearing.

WRIGHTS SCORE IN PATENT SUIT

PARIS, May 2.—In a decision handed down yesterday by the Third Civil Tribunal in the suit of Wright brothers against several French aeroplane manufacturers for an infringement of patents, the court upheld the contentions of the plaintiffs in principle, but declared that it did not wish at present to render a definite decision, as the science of aviation was too new to admit of an arbitrary finding in such a case.

Therefore the court appointed three experts to investigate whether there existed aviation discoveries calculated to disprove the priority of the American aviators' inventions and patents covering warped wings and vertical rudder.

The Wright suit against Santos-Dumont, was, however, dismissed on the ground that the defendant constructed aeroplanes only for his personal use.

The court overruled the contention of the French manufacturers that the Wright patents went by default because they were not exploited.

In the suits instituted at Paris Wilbur and Orville Wright alleged that the defendants had infringed their patents which covered inventions peculiar to their machines, laying special stress upon the warping principle, which they claim to have developed and patented in 1903. The defendants disputed the priority of the Wright discoveries.

BAR-SUR-AUBE, France, May 1.—Excited by the speeches made at a demonstration of several thousand wine growers yesterday, the workmen attempting to form a procession and attacked the dragoons, who sought to bar the way, a colonel and several of the troopers were unhorsed and injured. Several of the rioters were injured, and order was not restored until late in the evening.

OTTAWA, May 4.—Hon. Mr. Forget, former Lieut-Governor of Saskatchewan, has been appointed Senator in succession to Senator Roy, of Edmonton, who goes to Paris as Canadian Commissioner.

IN LOVING MEMORY.

Entered into rest on the evening of 17th April after a lingering illness which he bore with true Christian fortitude, Malcolm Campbell, an aged and respected resident of Victoria West, Lot 13, The deceased was born at Hampton, N.S., on the 20th February, 1821, and was in the 91st year of his age. He was the last surviving member of the family of the late Roderick Campbell, one of the early settlers and sturdy pioneers of that locality and had witnessed the many changes that had taken place in that and other sections of the country in its evolving from its wilderness state to what is now conceded to be one of the beauty spots of this fair Province. He removed with his family, a number of years ago, to Prince County and was regarded as one of the successful farmers. About ten years ago he suffered with a disease of the eyes which terminated in total blindness. He endured his affliction with wonderful patience until death relieved him of his sufferings.

Being a strict and devoted adherent of the Church of Scotland he died, as he had lived, fully trusting in the merits of a Crucified Redeemer.

SCOTLAND'S EXODUS TO CANADA'S FARMS

LONDON, May 1.—The Chronicle says: Keenly interested and proud as all Britishers are in the expansion of Canada in population and wealth, they regard the westward flight of the pick of the Scottish peasantry as an ominous sign for the mother country. The curious phenomenon of the rural exodus synchronizes with the marked revival of British agriculture. Experts who know both Canada and Britain say that, given an opportunity of getting land, they have quite a good chance of making a fair thing here as in Canada. Great Britain is carrying out a bold and sweeping rural policy to place the landless man on the manless land by the establishment of land banks to lend money on easy terms.

REPUDIATION OF THE TIES OF EMPIRE

LONDON, May 2.—The Sunday Observer says the question for Canada is whether to jeopardize her whole national birthright for the immediate mess of pottage, and adds: "We gladly agree that violent intention is not contemplated by the United States, but the vast majority of Americans, President Taft included, regard reciprocity as the agency leading by easy stages to pacific absorption."

"It is obvious," concluded the article, "that whatever happens, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's political strength is shaken to its foundations."

The Pall Mall Gazette says that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's absence from the imperial conference would come almost as a deliberate affront to the motherland, as a repudiation of the ties of the empire.

"We cannot think," it adds, "that Sir Wilfrid fully realizes the implications of his hasty ultimatum. He surely does not wish to go down to posterity as the last leader who played false to the empire in an hour pregnant with the issues of its integrity and welfare."

The Gazette adds that there is such a thing as bluff in Canadian as well as in English politics, and says it may be that Sir Wilfrid is trying to overcome his opponents' nerve. R. L. Borden and his friends, it concludes, would be false to their faith in Canadian nationality if they did not resist President Taft's machinations, and it is their plain duty to employ every weapon of resistance.

MONTREAL SOCIALISTS TO AID MCNAMARA

MONTREAL, May 2.—Following Socialist demonstrations yesterday, a meeting of protest, organized by local labor bodies with a view to enrolling Montreal working men in the movement to save J. J. McNamara, now under arrest in San Francisco, charged with being responsible for the Los Angeles Times' disaster and other crimes, was held at Modern Hall, Notre Dame Street East. Handbills had been distributed throughout the City, and there was a fair attendance and working men, both organized and unorganized, to hear what Mr. Killingbeck, of New York, and Mr. A. St. Martin, the local Socialist leader, had to say.

The handbills were of an incendiary nature, and called on all workmen to join in the movement to save McNamara from the gallows and to protect him from the conspiracy of capitalism and from the detectives, the hired thugs of the capitalists.

The speakers denounced the arrest of McNamara in even stronger terms and seemed to have the approval of their audience, who pledged themselves to follow the demands of the leaders, and to frally to the rescue of McNamara and his colleagues, although just how this was to be done was left somewhat unsettled.

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PREMIER HASZARD WINS—B. C. PROWSE SENATOR.

OTTAWA, May 4.—Premier Haszard has been appointed to the vacancy on the Supreme Court Bench of P. E. Island, while Benjamin Prowse has been elevated to the Senate in succession to Senator Ferguson.

J. M. Wilson of Montreal has been offered the vacancy in the Senate caused by the death of Senator Forget.

SIX MEN LOST INSTEAD OF FIVE.

EDMONTON, May 4.—It was learned here yesterday that six men, instead of five, were lost on Monday evening by the swamping of the scow ferry. The last person accounted for as lost is Peter Michaud, Canadian Immigration Agent.
