**Marooned Cows Are Guided To Safety**

(Canadian Press)  
AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 17.—Seventy-five cows, marooned for days on an elevated spit of land, were guided over the flooded Amherst marshes today to safety.

They had been isolated on the little island by heavy rains which covered the low-lying marshlands with water last week and cut them off from their pastures.

Today, residents rowed to the spot in boats, and drove the cattle through the water to dry land. Depth of water forced the animals to swim in some spots, but the crossing was negotiated in safety.

**Cattle Wheat And Honey**

This year has witnessed the heaviest exports of cattle to Great Britain in seven years. Up to October 5, when 2,112 head were shipped, including 200 from the port of Churchill in Hudson Bay, the number exported was well over the 40,000 mark. At the same time, other agricultural products from the West passed through Churchill, 307,000 bushels of wheat; 17 tons of Saskatchewan wheat; 1,100 pounds of dried egg powder, and 150,000 feet of sawn timber forming part of the cargo of the vessel that carried the cattle.

**Emancipation Of Chinese Women**

VANCOUVER, Oct. 17.—(C.P.)—Chinese women are more emancipated today than any other section of womanhood on the Asiatic continent, Dr. Hu Shih, outstanding Chinese scholar and philosopher, told the Women's Canadian Club.

In the Chinese legislature of 49 members, three are women, he said. Next year, with China as a constitutional democracy, women will have equal suffrage rights with men.

Such social changes in the Orient will undoubtedly lead to mitigation of the possibility of future wars in the Pacific area, he believed.

Foreign writers on Chinese life have given an erroneous impression of Chinese women to the world, Dr. Shih declared. In China, women are no longer silent, patient sufferers, but rather loquacious and vociferous. No nation has produced so many stories of henpecked husbands, he said, amid laughter from the audience.

**Rwy. Earnings**

MONTREAL, Oct. 17.—(C.P.)—Gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the week ended Oct. 14 totalled \$3,107,950 as compared with \$3,311,187 for the corresponding week of 1932, a decrease of \$275,237.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17.—(C.P.)—Gross earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the week ended Oct. 14 totalled \$2,794,000 as compared with \$2,810,000 in the corresponding week of last year, a decrease of \$16,000.

**Corn For Poultry**

The number of agricultural poisons registered under the Agricultural Pests Control Act last year was 362, a number slightly more than in the preceding year. The poisons consisted of insecticides, fungicides, disinfectants, rodent poisons, weed killers, etc. The Act is administered by the Dominion Seed Branch which maintains close cooperation with the Dominion Entomological Branch and with the Dominion Division of Botany in checking new preparations. The administration of the Act involves reviewing the latest world-legislation relating to insecticide and fungicide control, and the study of literature covering new preparations which will probably be offered for sale in Canada in the ensuing season. The trend is towards the manufacture of preparations harmless to man but fatal to pests.

**BRITISH SLOOP TO VISIT PERU**

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—(C. P.)—A romantic and adventurous voyage up the alligator infested waters of the Amazon River will be made early next year by His Majesty's ship Dundee, a sloop of the America and West Indies Squadron, it was learned when she visited this port recently. One of the most recent additions to the Royal Navy, the Dundee, will steam some 2,300 miles up the Amazon to the town of Iquitos, capital of the Peruvian state of Bajo Amazonia, where she will meet a flotilla of the Peruvian Navy.

Situated a short distance from the borders of Ecuador and Columbia, the town of Iquitos has a population of about 20,000 and thrives on the export of rubber, cotton, timber, nuts and ivory.

H. M. S. Dundee is armed with one four-inch gun, one four-inch anti-aircraft gun and four three pounders and is commanded by Captain W. H. G. Fallowfield.

**English Actress Quiets Storming Anti-Hitlerites**

LONDON, Oct. 18.—(C.P.)—Peggy Ashcroft, the English actress is given credit for "saving the situation" when an anti-fascist, anti-Hitler demonstration broke out in the Shaftesbury Theatre, on the recent first night of "Before Sunset," Gerhardt Hauptmann's play, in which Werner Krauss, famous German actor, appeared. Miss Ashcroft's cool appeal to the demonstrators, in the midst of hubbub, brought quiet and the play went on.

Among those in the stalls and boxes for the opening performance were Lady Diana Cooper, Lord Greenwood, Lady Ravensdale, Viscount Hambleton, Lady Lytton, Noel Coward, Gordon Selfridge and Maurice Baring.

There had been rumors of a demonstration, but the play opened quietly. Then as the strains of the "Blue Danube" waltz were heard, there was a hubbub in the gallery, some shouting, and the sudden descent of a shower of leaflets. Dozens fell in the stalls, on the heads of the men in their boiled shirts and the women in their gay evening apparel.

The leaflets read as follows: "A message to Hitler through Werner Krauss—We want British actors for British plays, not Nazi actors. Boycott Hitler. Buy British." "Down with the Nazis," shouted the demonstrators.

Police were soon stumbling down the gangways and over seats in an effort to reach the men, who continued their demonstration. Women screamed. Angry shouts came from the audience. A man stood up in the circle and made a violent anti-Hitler speech. He was pounced upon by policemen and forcibly dragged from the place.

The first interruption lasted only a minute or two. Then the play proceeded quietly for a little while. But again there came signs of trouble in another part of the house.

The hubbub grew. There was the shrill blast of a police whistle in the gallery. The curtain fell.

A trim little figure in a blue frock with a white collar pushed through from the stage and faced the uproar quietly. It was Peggy Ashcroft. She stood there a moment. The house became quiet. She put up her hand and said:

"Please—please. There are 30 English actors and actresses behind this curtain tonight, as well as all our friends in front, and we are all proud of the privilege and happiness of playing with this great artist. I only wish those who do not wish to hear us would not come—or would please stay away."

"There was a crash of applause and the performance proceeded. When Werner Krauss himself appeared later in the first act there was a hush of expectancy. He came slowly down towards the footlights, a dignified white-haired figure in blue lounge suit, with stock and black walking stick reminding some of those present of the late Lord Oxford and Asquith.

His eyes searched the audience and he waited a moment. Nothing happened. Then he went on with his part. There were no further interruptions. The police had apparently removed all the offenders who were said to number about 20 or 30. No arrests were made.

**Trap Nests**  
A trap-nest for poultry is a nest with a door so arranged that, when it is set, the hen can enter the nest and the set of so doing springs the trap so that the hen is confined to the nest until released. When the hen is let out, the trap is again set and is ready for another hen. Farmers can breed up the laying qualities of their flocks, says the Dominion Poultry Husbandman, by using trap-nests from November the first, to say March, or until they become too busy in the spring. A pamphlet issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture gives some valuable information on how to make and use trap-nests.

**Football in Philippines**  
Lagging interest in football in the Philippines is to be revived this season so that the islands may compete with China and Japan at the next Oriental Olympics. Football has had a strong hold in several of the Philippine provinces, but, according to experts, there has not been enough competition to keep the players on their toes. Both China and Japan have sent teams to Manila to win victories, and lovers of the sport are urging that an all-star team be formed and placed under a strong coach. The players would be chosen by a committee of former football players and other experts.
