WEEK OF PRAYER OPENED IN BAPTIST CHURCH

Inspiring Service And Splendid Address By Adjutant Martin

The opening service of the Week of Prayer was held last night in the Baptist Church. A true spirit of devotion prevailed and the many who were in attendance entered heartily into the worship of prayer, praise and thanksgiving.

The service was taken part in by Rev. H. D. Raymond, Rev. W. Bruce Muir, Rev. Dr. Coffin, Rev. J. M. MacLeod, Rev. Hammond Johnson and Adjutant Martin, officer commanding the Charlottetown post of the Salvation Army, who gave the address.

The speaker, whose words were spoken in the spirit of sincerity and truth, took his text from Psalm 105 V.V. 1-7. The subject of his discourse was "Thanksgiving and Humiliation" and he dealt first of all with the reasons which we in Canada have for thanksgiving, in manufacturing, transportation, trade, mining and agriculture, substantial gains were recorded. In the banks the savings had reached new heights—as had also the credits extended and the savings deposits.

The iron and steel trade was unusually prosperous, and the 1928 grain crop had touched a new record, 500,613,000 bushels—60 million more than in 1927.

Our railways had had the best earnings in their history. The gross earnings of the Canadian National were 226 1-2 million dollars, and those of the Canadian Pacific 183 1-2 million dollars—an increase over last year of 11 per cent. in each case.

Canada's trade was two and one half million dollars—a gain of a quarter of a million. Our exports were one and one third million dollars, and our imports one and one quarter million, leaving a margin of exports over imports.

In view of all this, said the speaker we had indeed come to sing "O Canada" around the family altar.

Adjutant Martin then touched on the need for thanksgiving. Alluding to the Psalm chosen as his text, he said that it was written by the king when he was bringing the Ark back to Jerusalem. The city was full of joy, for the people were glad to have the Ark back in their midst.

Christians should never forget their duty of giving thanks to God for all His goodness towards them. And they should make known his deeds and tell abroad His wondrous works. We should help ourselves out of sight and in our prayer meetings and elsewhere, make known the deeds of the Lord.

Then we must sing unto the Lord. It is a sure sign of a revival when people commence to sing. Just as in Jerusalem of old, the Ark of the Lord is moving on and people are coming to it to be saved.

The speaker then went on to stress the need of humiliation. He contrasted the spirit of the Pharisee and Publican, as set forth in the parable of Our Lord in Luke 18 v.v. 9-14. The humility of the publican was commended and the self-righteousness and spiritual pride of the Pharisee condemned.

He dwelt at some length on the manifold ills which spring from such wicked pride, by which Lucifer was cast out from Heaven, and Nebuchadnezzar lost his throne. From this he went on to a consideration of the uselessness of a religion which is nothing save empty form, and the necessity for man to confess his sins before God and reconcile himself with Him.

Adjutant Martin stressed the grand simplicity of the Publican's prayer: "God be merciful to me a sinner." "May God," he said, "write it on every unsaved heart here with us tonight!"

There is not a soul in this audience tonight that cannot send up this prayer. Perhaps you will forget this sermon, but don't forget that prayer. May some hearts be given

Prohibition Court at Summerside

Magistrate George J. Tweedy held Court in Summerside on Saturday, January fifth, and four parties were convicted of offenses against the Prohibition Act. The first case was a charge adjourned for judgment against a Borden party for selling liquor. His Honor held that a prima facie case had been made out, which the accused had failed to answer.

The second case was against a party from Newton, also charged with selling liquor. Two witnesses testified that they had bought intoxicating liquor from the accused, who was thereupon convicted by Mr. Tweedy.

The third case was against a Summerside party charged with selling liquor. Evidence was given by two men from the country, of the purchase of liquor from the accused, on different occasions. The accused pleaded guilty and was fined \$200.00 and costs, or three months in gaol.

The fourth case was against a Summerside youth charged with unlawful possession of liquor. Inspector Mann gave evidence of following the accused one evening and of seeing the accused take a quart bottle of rum out of his pocket and break it on the sidewalk when he became aware of the Inspector's presence. The young man pleaded not guilty and gave evidence regarding the occasion in question, but he did not give any testimony regarding the breaking of the bottle. His Honor therefore found the accused guilty, and sentenced him to a fine of \$200.00 and costs, or three months in gaol.

Chief Inspector Bennet J. Haywood appeared for the Prosecution in the Borden and Newton cases, and Mr. Thane A. Campbell in the Summerside cases. Mr. Tweedy will again hold Court in Summerside on February second.—S.
