The sons are Wallace R., August of Sackville, and Edward and Charles, of New York. The daughters are Mrs Manning of Moncton, Mrs Biggs of Amherst, and Miss Isabelle, Edmonton, Alberta, with whom Mrs Rodd is now on a visit. One brother George Rodd, of North Milton, P. E. I., and two sisters, Mrs John McLaughlin and Mrs Nathan McMillan, of Stanhope or Cove Head P. E. I. also survive.—Moncton Transcript.
