LIFE SAVED BY BABY.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., May 20.—Mrs. D. P. Colter, victim of an attempted assault, lives to-day because her nine-months-old baby, lying on her breast, caught in its own little body the bullets fired at her by her assailant. The baby died instantly. This city has been terrorized lately by a series of attempted assaults on women, committed, it is believed, by a mysterious person, whom the police call "Jack the Shooter." Early yesterday the man entered the Colter residence and attacked Mrs. Colter, who held her baby in her arms. She made an outcry and the intruder fired at her twice, both bullets striking the child. The mother was unhurt. Half an hour afterwards, the same man entered the residence of M. M. Hankins fired at Mrs. Hankins and at the policemen who were attracted by her cries. The police emptied their revolvers at his fleeing form, but he escaped again.

Recently Col. Hon. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, visited Moncton in his official capacity. Among the military men at the station to meet him was Capt. W. A. McKee, formerly of Charlottetown.

The steamer Cascapedia arrived in Charlottetown last night at eleven o'clock and after discharging her freight will receive freight for Montreal and along the coast. The steamer will probably sail from here this afternoon.

The following produce prices were secured on the Charlottetown market square yesterday and have prevailed since last Friday:—White oats, 56c; black oats, 58c; potatoes, 55 to 65c; pork, 9 to 10c; beef (quarter), per lb, 8 to 10c; beef (small), per lb, 8 to 10c. The prices quoted by the wholesalers are: Potatoes, 50 to 55c pressed hay, \$13; white oats, 55 to 65c; black oats, 58 to 60c; pork, 9 to 10c; straw, \$5.50, and turnips, 20c.

Yesterday the eastern express arrived in Charlottetown at 9.15 a. m., on time; the southern accommodation at 9.35 a. m., on time; the Tignish accommodation at 11.45 a. m., five minutes late; the Summerside accommodation at 3.25 p. m., twenty-five minutes late; the eastern accommodation at 6.10 p. m., fifty minutes late; and the western express at 10.10 twenty minutes late on the previous night the western express arrived in Charlottetown at 10.45, fifty-five minutes late.

Last evening hundreds of citizens were at the Charlottetown Driving Park to witness the Speeders. Two splendid races took place. The first one was a half mile trotting race between the promising young trotters while the other was a mile race between three well known pacers. These matinee events have caused much interest and a great deal of pleasure and it is hoped that they will be a regular feature throughout the season. If so they will popularize the Driving Park and make it the centre of interest for sport lovers. It is a good sign to see the horse lovers taking such an interest in the track and shows that this year's speed events will be of greater importance than ever before. There is no reason that with the splendid material now available this Province should not be in the very lead at all Maritime events this year.

A wedding breakfast was served the bridal party, after which the newly married couple left for their future home in Miami, Arizona, where Mr. Gill is in business. The bride is the eldest daughter of Frank Farquharson of the Trinidad Novelty Works, and received her education in the Trinidad public schools. On account of the storm Sunday evening, May 19th, the service of praise arranged for by the Vernon River Methodist Church was not given but will be rendered next Sunday evening, May 26th.

On Sunday next Professor Hiram Hall, well known in Charlottetown, will conclude his engagement as organist of the First Baptist Church, Moncton. As previously reported, he has accepted a position as organist in a church at Vancouver, B.C.

Wesley Frost, the new American Consul for Charlottetown, will arrive here on June 4th. Mr. Frost who is twenty-eight years of age and recently married, has formerly been employed as stenographer in the Bureau of Trades, Washington.—Exc.

Rough weather has proved a handicap to the tug William Atken which is engaged in repairing the Maritimes Telegraph and Telephone Co Cable between this province and the mainland. Much of the work has to be done with small boats and for this reason calm weather is necessary.

Yesterday morning the Harland returned to Charlottetown from Brush Wharf where she had remained overnight and left again in the afternoon at three o'clock for Orwell ports, returning in the evening. She had a number of passengers and a good general cargo on each trip. She leaves this afternoon at three o'clock for Crapaud, remaining there overnight and returning to this port the following morning.

Yesterday the Hillsboro Cadet Corps was inspected by Captain Outbit, Halifax. This corps numbers thirty-eight and is instructed by Herbert Yeo, Vice-Principal of the Hillsboro Consolidated School. The corps was put through squad and company drill, rifle exercise and outpost duties, in all of which they acquitted themselves well. At the close of the inspection the Captain expressed himself as well pleased with the efficiency of the corps. Arms and equipment were all accounted for and were in perfect order.

Rev. George Orman has remitted to the General Missionary Society of the Methodist Church of Canguia the sum of sixty-five dollars from Vernon River and Cherry Valley, all received up to date. It is fifteen dollars behind last year, a regrettable fact, but it must be borne in mind that, receiving no grant, one hundred and seventy-five dollars were set free for service elsewhere so that the amount remitted is a straight contribution for missions. It is worthy of note that in two years of the present pastor's term there was no grant.

The new switchboard for the P. E. I. Telephone Co Central office at Charlottetown has arrived from Montreal and awaits the completion of the improvements to the interior of their building before it can be placed in position and connected up for operation. The new board is of the Central Energy system and is practically the same as the one destroyed by fire some time ago except that it is of more modern construction and contains all the newest features. It has an ultimate capacity for 1600 phones. It is anticipated that the work of installation will begin about the first of June.
