WESTERN TRAIN TO BE RESTORED

Public Meeting at Tignish Adopts Resolution Calling for Restoration and Investigation

ALBERTON, Feb. 20.—(Special).—The first of a series of specially arranged indignation meetings was held at Tignish last night.

Resolved that the federal Government be and is hereby requested to restore at once to the western portion of the Island its second train, conceded by Hon. Mr. Blair as a public necessity and much more essential to public convenience now than ever before; and further:

INCREASED SUBSIDIES AND THE FISHERY AWARD

FREDERICTON, Feb. 20.—(Special). Premier Tweedie continued his budget speech today.

HOUSE COMMONS DEBATE ADDRESS

Government Will Endorse Free Trade by Resolution Denouncing Taxation of Food or Any System of Protection—Irish Unionists Will Move Amendment.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—(Special).—The House of Commons devoted the entire day to a desultory debate on the address in reply to the King's speech.

The Government gave notice of the following motion: Recognizing the general decision of the people of the United Kingdom in ministering unqualified fidelity to the principles of free trade, the House of Commons deems it right to record its determination to resist any proposals whether for the taxation of foreign corn or by the erection of a general tariff on foreign goods, which will create a system of protection.
