MORE IMMIGRANTS ARRIVE AT ST. JOHN

St. John, March 11.—(Special)—The Lake Erie arrived today with twelve hundred immigrants, all future Canadians. The majority were of British stock and a fine lot of people.

Among them was another party, numbering three hundred, sent out by Lord Rothschild for which positions have been already found in Ontario.

MOST APPALLING COAL MINE EXPLOSION

Twelve Hundred Miners Killed by an Explosion in French Mine—Horrible Scenes—The Worst Accident Yet Recorded in Continental Mining—The Populace Stricken—Will take Eight days to Recover Bodies

Paris, Mar. 11.—(Special)—Probably twelve hundred miners are dead as the result of an explosion of gas in a coal mine near Bethune. Eighteen hundred miners went down into the mine this morning and only six hundred have returned. Others are shut off and it is feared that all are asphyxiated. The origin of the explosion is unknown. The force of the explosion was so great that it shattered the buildings at the

mouth of the pit and killed men there. Rescue parties are working hard, though without hope. The scene of the catastrophe is the mountainous region near Lens, where there are the most productive coal mines of France. The mining population is about two thousand. The populace is frantic with horror. There was an appalling scene at the mouth of the pit. The few who escaped were horribly

burned, and disfigured. The disaster is the greatest in the history of continental mining. A hundred and fifty bodies have been recovered. It will take eight days digging to reach the others. LATER, PARIS, March 11.—(Special)—The latest estimate places number killed eleven hundred.

BAINES HAWKINS HAS FOUNDERED

Has a Result of a Collision off Scatarie—Boat-swain Believed to be Drowned—Rest Saved in Boats—Was Insured for Twenty-Thousand Dollars.

SYDNEY, March 11.—(Special)—The Steamer Baines Hawkins owned here foundered off Scatarie on Saturday as a result of collision with the Drifwood. Thomas Howdridge of this city, the boatswain is believed to have been drowned.

The rest of the crew reached the shore safely in one of the steamer's boat. The value of the boat is thirty-four thousand dollars; insurance twenty thousand.

THE GOOD BOOK STILL IN RUSSIA

LONDON, March 9.—In spite of the disturbed condition of Russia, the Bible Society's Agent in St. Petersburg reports a circulation of over half-a-million copies of the Scriptures during 1905. This is exclusive of a large circulation in Siberia, of which complete statistics are not yet to hand. So far, the Bible Society's workers and depots in the Russian Empire have in no way suffered during the recent disturbances. The Society's Agent in Siberia writes from Ekaterinburg: "Our great need is more Books. Our collectors in the East are selling more of the Bible Edition of the Russ New Testament than they have ever done before. The stock has run out, and owing to strikes the forwarding of fresh supplies is somewhat erratic, though thanks to the courtesy of the authorities, two large consignments have been dispatched. The soldiers as they went East promised to buy, if spared, as they returned from the war. The bulk of them looked upon this as a solemn vow, and are buying Bibles and Testaments freely. We have never before sold so many in so short a period."

C. P. R. EXPERIMENT WITH LOCOMOTIVE

MONTREAL, March 9.—The C. P. R. is experimenting with what is said to be the largest locomotive ever built. This locomotive is designed by Mr. Vaughan, assistant to President Van-Horne. It left the shops last night under its own steam for the north bay division on which it will be tried out.

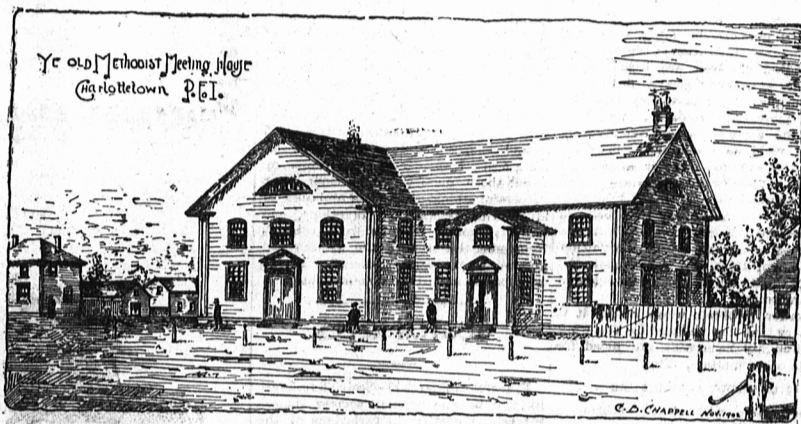
The C. P. R. is trying to get an engine that will take the transcontinental across to Vancouver in one section. Hitherto when traffic has been at all heavy it has been found necessary to break the transcontinental into two sections. This new engine, if it fulfills expectations will take a train of twenty-passenger cars across the continent.

Though the C. P. R. authorities admit that they have built the largest engine ever constructed in America, they will not give out any particulars as to its weight or manner of construction.

RIOTING YET IN FRENCH TOWNS

PARIS, March 9.—Serious rioting occurred today at several provincial towns in the course of the inventorying of church property under the law providing for the separation of church and state. At Boeschepe, near Dunkirk, a manifestation was shot dead and the Government Commissioner was wounded. Churches at Bressure, Belfort and Charleville were strongly barricaded and crowded with demonstrators, who prevented the making of inventories by burning sulphur and throwing lights in the face of the Gendarmes.

GENEROSITY OF A MONCTONIAN

MONCTON, N. B. March 9.—While a proposal to buy certain properties for the erection of the new intercolonial work shops has caused a good deal of talk about the prices, certain localities are going up to an alarming extent. Still there are many people who are disposed to act most generously towards the railway in the matter, and will do all in their power to aid in the speedy erection of the new shops. The city of Moncton proposes to give Bridge Street, which contains three acres, provided the Government expropriates the land adjoining. The Government owns the entire property on one side of this street, which is 2,000 feet long.

G. R. Jones, son of the late Oliver Jones, has authorized the Transcript this afternoon to state that he will present the Government with a site for the new work shops at Sunny Brae, on a perfectly level patch of land within one hundred rods of the railway station at Humphrey's. The site is one mile from Main Street, Moncton, and he will give free to the Government, one or two hundred acres as required.

THE SALARIES OF TEACHERS

ST. JOHN, N. B. March 9.—New Brunswick school teachers who are seeking a general increase in salaries will have much sympathy for their conferees in the Province of Quebec. It is asserted that the average pay of Roman Catholic teachers in that Province is ninety-three dollars a year and of Protestant teachers one hundred and fifty dollars, equal to twenty-seven and forty cents a day, respectively. It may be added that there the standard of education corresponds in many cases with the salary paid.

The Command of The Warship Dominion goes to a former Toronto Man

TORONTO, Ont., March 11.—(Special)—A telegram received here today says that Capt. Charles Kingsmill, son of the late Judge Kingsmill of Toronto, has been appointed commander of the battleship Dominion.

MOROCCO MATTER IS SATISFACTORY

BERLIN, March 9.—Private conversation between the German and French envoys at Algiers have brought them almost to an agreement on the Moroccan police controversy, so near that the Foreign Office here regards a satisfactory issue of the conference as assured. Germany, it is understood, accepts France and Spain as having the officers best fitted for policing Morocco and France accepts international control in principle, undertaking to supply adequate guarantee that the police shall not be national in character. It is the specific form of these guarantees that remains so unsettled and continues to be the subject for discussion. It is likely that an international inspectorship will be created consisting of a single officer of repute from a power other than France, Spain or Germany. The detail which continues to be discussed is the propriety of the Inspector being located in a neutralized harbor. The ministers of the power will also exercise general observation over the police.
