(Continued from page 1) The money to be paid is not the chief consideration, if the garage owners can get top-flight men. Unfortunately, top-flight mechanics, to use an expressive phrase, are a "dime a dozen" and are a very scarce breed of individual.

Still Short of Carpenters A-1 carpenters are still in keen demand at the Employment Office, and there are few applicants to fill the orders of the various contractors who could use them. Hammer-and-saw men, there are aplenty, but the real qualified workman is not to be had.

Students Seeking Work Although the National Employment Office has made extra efforts to place all students, who are looking for work, local officials say there are still about twenty-four students with applications on file, who have not been placed. Employers have found, according to the local office, that the students are fine workers, whether employed as labourers, salesmen or in any other capacity.

Road Work Highway maintenance, and construction work on the Provincial highways is absorbing many of the unemployed people in the rural sections. At the present time, the local office is paying Unemployment Insurance benefits to only eighty-five people in the rural areas of King's and Queen's Counties. In fact, the total number of claims at present, has fallen from a peak of one thousand in mid-winter, to just over two hundred at the present time. This total includes claims being paid in Charlottetown, and throughout King's and Queen's Counties.

Domestic Help It is just about as difficult to secure domestic help, as it is to secure farm labour, and the Office has many unfilled applications for domestics. It was pointed out by the local officials that contrary to the opinion held by many people, that girls who refuse this type of work if it is suitable are not permitted to draw Unemployment In-

Disqualification For Benefits In every case where it is considered that the man or woman should accept the employment offered, taking for granted of course, that he or she is capable of performing the work, disqualification follows refusal to accept such offers. It has happened, however, that over and over again that farmers in the rural areas have complained that such-and-such an individual is drawing Unemployment Insurance Benefits and has refused work. Unfortunately unless farmers in such cases report the matter to the Local Office, or place an order for a man, the Local Office is unable to take any action to suspend payments or disqualify the individual who may refuse work. It would be very helpful if all such cases were reported to the Local Office, the Charlottetown officials said.
