CANADA'S PARCEL POST WORKING WELL

HALIFAX, July 21.—Members of the Federal and Provincial Governments, the Mayor of Halifax, representatives of the churches, and hundreds of citizens last night joined in an enthusiastic welcome to the delegates of the Grand International Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Canadian divisions, of which are in convention in this city.

PARIS, July 21.—Mme. Henriette Caillaux, the wife of Joseph Caillaux, former premier of France, and former minister of finance, occupied the prisoner's enclosure in the assize court at the palace of justice yesterday and recited in a dramatic manner the circumstances leading up to the shooting of Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro, with whose murder on March 16th she is charged.

(Special to The Guardian) ST. JOHN, July 22.—St. John tonight is in the midst of a strike with a possibility of the men in the power houses being called out and the city being thrown into darkness. The trouble originated over the dismissal of Fred Ramsay, President of the Street Railway and Electric Power House Workers' Union. Ramsay was charged with several offences of a minor character and dismissed. The men claimed the company had been animated by a desire to strike at their Union and that the treatment accorded Ramsay was unfair.

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OTTAWA, July 21.—No special check is being kept by the post office department upon the revenues from the parcels post, but the inspector's report that the volume of traffic is steadily increasing and that the system is working very satisfactorily. It was inaugurated in February with a five pound limit at the start, but this limitation was soon removed, and parcels accepted up to eleven pounds.

It was a notable gathering, and from point of hundreds and excellent of speeches, not less than for the spontaneous enthusiasm with which the very atmosphere seemed surcharged.

Mme. Caillaux held the attention of the crowded court room for three hours. Slight, almost insignificant in appearance, and possessing none of the outward characteristics of a figure of romance, she spoke with great assurance, addressing herself in turn to each part of the room like a lecturer. She told her story in short disconnected sentences, but showed remarkable skill in marshalling her facts, so as to represent them in the best light for her cause.

She shook with sobs, and placed a handkerchief over her face from time to time, looking round as though searching for a friendly face. The clerk then called the list of witnesses, each of whom answered "present," and then left the court. The prisoner looked at each of the witnesses as he or she replied. Joseph Caillaux, the prisoner's husband, answered in a firm voice, and she watched him as he left the court.

THE WEATHER.—There was more unsettled weather yesterday. A fine warm day was succeeded in the evening by some rain and afterwards it became very cool.

The prisoner then made a long statement, referring frequently to notes. Her voice was steady. Other witnesses during the afternoon were Fred B. Edgecombe and C. F. Chestnut, both of Fredericton. They were directors of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company, having been qualified for their purpose. They had not paid for their stock and did not know whether any person else had or had not paid for it.

Mme. Caillaux added that painful incidents were taking place all the time among her acquaintances when she was shopping, and even in her home. She continued: "The attacks of the Figaro were implacable. They had nothing to do with politics. They were personal. I suffered. I lost my head."

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HINDUS LIKELY TO DEPART IN PEACE

VANCOUVER, July 21.—Just before seven this morning, the Hindus, through the shore committee, agreed to accept the terms of the Government, and will to-night allow peaceful possession of the Komagata Maru. There will be no fighting. The Hindus made many new demands, but were finally forced to accept the proposals of the officials, which were to provide them with medicine and six thousand dollars worth of food for the return trip. They absolutely refused to give money for their return fares or to allow anything to the local Hindu committee by way of recompense. At seven o'clock Captain Yamamoto started out for his vessel to get steam up. Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture in the Federal Parliament, was largely the director of negotiations this afternoon with the Hindus. After the return of the local Hindu committee, at 3.15, from their talk on the Maru, the seven Hindus held a private meeting in the immigration headquarters to draft a written reply to the Government. They decided they wanted legal advice, and went up town to see A. H. MacNeill. They brought him back with them before five o'clock, and submitted

OTTAWA, July 22.—The Government is keeping in very close touch with developments at Vancouver, and messages acquainting it with the goings-on yesterday were frequent. The Ottawa end of it is about finished. The Hindus were ineligible for admission under the immigration laws, their deportation is ordered, and it is for the department officials at Vancouver to carry out these instructions. Recognizing the difficulties of the situation, and in view of Saturday night's episode, the cruiser Rainbow was requisitioned. Whether they submit calmly or only after determined resistance, the deportation order is absolute. From what can be learned here it is probable that the Hindus will be sent back by the Empress of Japan on Thursday, but the decision in that regard is left largely with the departmental officers on the scene. It is believed that the Sikhs may be handled with much less difficulty on the Komagata Maru. The Government had nothing to do with the calling out of the militia at Vancouver. This action was taken on the requisition of the mayor in anticipation of trouble, not so much on the Maru as ashore, where the anti-Asiatic feeling was reported to be very strong. The situation is being handled at Ottawa personally by Sir Robert Borden, Hon. C. J. Doherty, acting Minister of the Interior, and Hon. Arthur Meighen, Solicitor-General.
