**MOVING PICTURES.**

We associate the moving pictures (for the most part) with photographs. These pictures, reproduced become very life-like, and more or less leave their impressions upon us. Among these, we noticed a middle-aged man. In one hand he had a valise; in the other a little chap with light curly hair somewhere about two years of age. Behind these were three little children all of the same family, the eldest, a girl about eight, the next a boy about six, and another girl between four and five.

Arriving in the cabin the father placed the boy baby, who kept crying for hours during the trip, upon the soft cushions of the steamer, while he went to secure a state room. The other three little ones surrounded their infant brother and tried to keep him from crying. A motherly woman came over to the gathering and said in an excited manner, "Where's the mother of this baby?" The eldest girl replied, "Mother is dead. She died two days ago." We noticed the woman's eyes moisten as she took the little fellow up in her arms to try and pacify him. Before the father came back we heard the girl say that they buried mother in the States and came down to the train after.

It did not take long for many on board to read between the lines, for one touch of nature (say what one will) makes the whole world kin.

At Summerside the father of that little family had only the little crying lad to convey to the train in waiting. His valise and other children were all looked after. Moreover these children had more bananas, oranges and candies given them by passengers than ever doubtless in their lives. The crying child was lulled to sleep before Hunter River was reached by a woman's tenderness, and the tired out father had a short rest before reaching his destination.

There were other light and shade effects to this picture, which perhaps two or three verses from Henry W. Longfellow's poem "Resignation" may supply the prospective or setting:

We see but dimly through the mist and vapors  
Amid these earthly dampings  
What seems to us but sad funeral tapers  
May be Heaven's distant lamps.

Thus do we walk with her, and keep unbroken  
The bond which nature gives,  
Thinking that our remembrance though unspoken  
May reach her where she lives.

We will be patient and assuage the feeling  
We may not wholly stay;  
By silence sanctifying, not concealing  
The grief that must have way.

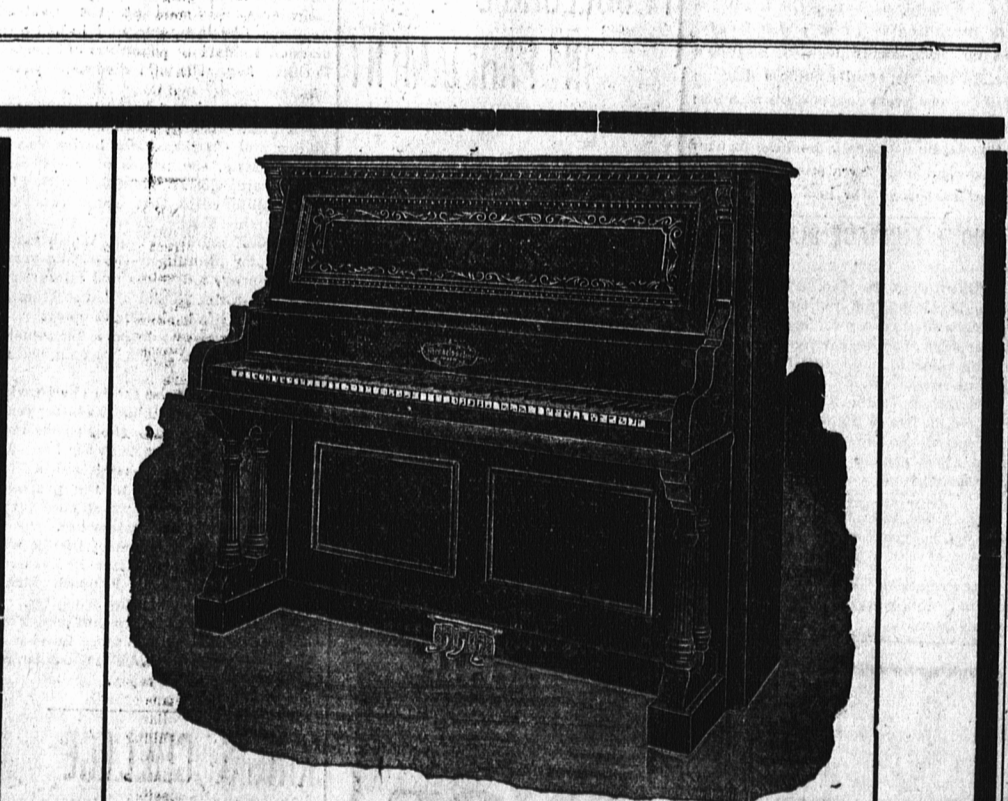
