NAVAL BATTLE OF THURSDAY

With Russian Losses of Ships Fully Confirmed

Great Land Battle Imminent Near Hai Cheng—Kuropatkin About to Assume the Offensive.

REPORTS CONFIRMED.

LONDON, June 27.—(Special)—Admiral Togo's official account of the naval battle which took place last Thursday confirms the reports of the destruction of a Russian battleship besides disabling two other vessels. The Japanese had but little damage.

SHAPING FOR BATTLE

Despatches from Ta Teehoo Cho indicate that both the Russian and Japanese armies are moving into contact for a great battle.

KUROPATKIN ON THE OFFENSIVE.

General Kuropatkin yesterday assumed the offensive against General Oku, while General Kuroki from a position fourteen miles to the eastward was moving against the Russian flank at Hai Cheng.

RUSSIANS HEAR NEWS.

Further news is anxiously awaited. The Russians profess to have news that two big Japanese vessels were seriously damaged in the fight at Port Arthur.

HUMOR, PATHOS AND ELOQUENCE

With Saving Salt in Rev. Mr. Pearse's Lecture

Tonight He will Give an Address on Christian Socialism in the First Methodist Church.

There was lots of fun and something better in the First Methodist Church last evening among the large congregation over which L. B. Pearse presided and which Rev. Mark Guy Pearse addressed. There has been many a duller evening in the Opera House with a crack company occupying the stage.

But the reverend lecturer is a host in himself and has apparently more humor in his composition than the full quota of the twelve Apostles. For a time the surroundings of pulpit, pews and sacred walls restrained the merriment which bubbled up, and a little later broke clear of control, till laughter and cheers paid hearty tribute to the speaker's histrionic and story telling powers.

They are inimitable, the stage lost much, as no doubt the pulpit gained a rare man when the boy of six was converted by the agency of the venerable Rosa who so narrowly escaped the work house to make an abundant entrance to a better land, and he, in answer to her prayers became a preacher.

He asked his auditory to sing "Rock of Ages" at the end of "the first lesson," or first of the three divisions of his discourse and led the tune, but the response was somewhat hesitant and not so hearty as in meetings devoted more exclusively to worship. Not that the preceding stories had been too funny or were of the mere pea shooting variety after the manner of the man who was brought before Alexander the Great, and hoped for reward or because he was more expert than all others in shooting peas through a very small hole in a large.

That man looked for reward and he got it. The King, it is said, ordered him a bushel of peas that he might have never want for ammunition. There are many pea-shooters in the world today, but Mr. Pearse is not of their number. He has an object in at least most of his stories. The humor and fun of them are always harmless, frequently refining and elevating. Pathos, eloquence and humor are made to the heart lessons of true manliness, self sacrifice, faith and love. The National Anthem closed the proceedings.

Just before it was sung Pastor Young announced that Mr. Pearse will tonight in the same place deliver his celebrated lecture on Christian Science and at the Wednesday evening service will give a reading of the 23rd Psalm. At tonight's lecture a collection will be taken at the door for the Organ Fund of Grace Church.
